Priceville.

Ever since it has been an established fact that the Proton-Walkerton Railway was going to touch this village, the citizens have come well to the front in enthusiasm. For many years she has battled with reverses, owing largely to surrounding railway points, naturally drawing things their way, combined also with losses in other directions as the burning of two consecutive flour mills, clearing out of the timber (for this was a grand square timber camp,) burning of one of her two saw-mills, &c. She is geographically one of the finest situated points in Ontario. In picturesque location, she has no superior, nestling amongst the Highlands of Artemesia and Glenelg Townships, and on the west and south west banks of the Saugeen River—amongst green trees and well made green sod, in summer time she is superb.

The Saugeen River furnishes a water power soon again to be used to operate a co-operative grist mill—a long felt want. This power also furnishes power for the present saw-mill and chipping mill. The citizens have many new schemes on foot, whereby more of the natural resources will be developed. The Moss Lake, located at an altitude that should give at least a 100 foot water head when drained into the Saugeen, will be utilized in time. A third water power is also available.

Brickyard clay is here in inexhaustible quantity, that will make first-class white brick. This was once the pride of the country and now the depot will be right at its doors. This industry again will be an addition to the country.

The Standard Bank of Canada, established during the summer of 1906 is doing a satisfactory business and the community are realizing what an important asset this is.

Application has been made for two grain elevators. New places of business are opening up and many enquiries are being made to open others.

The village is now a police village daily organized and enthusiastic meetings are held by the citizens, devising ways and means to bring this place to the front, not only as a pretty but as a business centre, and the coming summer will see a very great change. The railway of course has been the good angel in reviving the spirit of the people. A petition signed by every eligible person last fall, and given to Mr Morrow purchasing agent of the C P R., was the indicator showing the determination of the citizens to do all in their power to not only welcome the railway but show their good will to do everything in their power to make this an important shipping centre. Meetings since have enthusiastically endorsed the sentiments of the people. They are always well attended and everyone is wide awake to do what he can to promote the welfare of the community and have it so the place will at once derive benefits of having a station here. In the early spring, sidewalks will be laid out to it, and the street leading thence will be improved. Main street and other streets will likewise be beneficially treated. Determination is rampant that this is going to be an important shipping and railway point. The territory is large and fertile. Ten miles radius of this country it, and the street centre, feed it. Naturally therefore inhabitants within this circle want to see it come to the front and many have signified their intention of helping it do so.

Some little consternation has been created by a kind of dead lock that has existed for a few weeks (and quite unknown to the citizens of Priceville) between the C P R and Artemesia council, over the closing of a certain Street in Priceville. The citizens after circulating the petition above spoken of thought they had done what was required of them. Apparently the T. p. clerk and Artemesia never received the petition—so arose the misunderstanding. However the Citizens' Committee calling a public meeting on the 22nd, soon ferreted out the trouble and immediately applied the remedy and the Council will close the street just as soon as the necessary documents are made out which will be done in a day or so.

Municipal contests are now topics mostly everyone is more or less interested in. It seems kind of out of place for us not to be putting to battle our old war-horse, champion and most highly respected citizen, Mr John McArthur, warden of the township. However as he held offices for over 26 years, it must in a sense be a relief to him to get away for a year or so from responsibility of public life but we know it must be equally hard to yield to quiet life after such an exceptionally long term. We hope to have the privilege of working for him again in some other capacity in the Political arena, since we cannot have the pleasure this time.

New Year's eve saw the Baptist church holding an anniversary with a crowded house and an excellent programme. Talent assisted from Flesherton and Durham. The Durham choir was well received; they were a great treat, and so was Mr Joe Cornfield's little nine year old daughter from Flesherton; she is certainly wonderful.
