Town Council.

The new Council met on Monday as per statute and all took the necessary declarations. After appointing the committees which appear below, they adjourned till the evening, and spent a pretty long session in a useful way. We have a good council, all alert to their duties and the town may reasonably expect good work from them.

At the other end of the table from Mayor Calder sits recce Saunders, the Mayor's right are Cochrane, Swallow, Lenahan and to the left, Whelan, McLachlan, McGowan. They have started on the year's business with a run that bespeaks progress and amongst their first acts was to let it be known that taxes must be promptly paid, the surprising statement being made that some last year was not paid till November!

C. Elvidge is Assessor, John Clark Constable and Health officer, Jas Davidson caretaker at a slightly increased salary, W. J. Adams, trust officer, T. Daniels pond keeper and fence viewers are Messrs Cowardine, James Davidson, Lock Elvidge.

Dr. Hutton is Medical Health Officer and Messrs. Koch and McIntosh are Auditors. Salary \$10 each.

Accounts were presented amounting to \$232.26 and checks ordered to be issued.

An important motion by Cochrane—Saunders—Ordered all taxes to be paid by 1st Feb., as at that date a collector would be appointed and costs incurred. The new Council intends to back this up.

On motion of McLachlan—Whelan a grant of \$10 was made to the Sick Children's Hospital.

Nine copies of the Municipal Ward was ordered for use of the Council.

McLachlan—Whelan—That the question of back interest supposed to be owing by the Durham Furniture Co. on first mortgage be considered as settled in full at the discharge of said mortgage, and that the matter be now finally disposed of.—Carried.

I. O. F. Banquet.

Tuesday night, Court Durham, No. 111, had another of their annual banquets, and the brethren, and especially Bro Wm. Johnston, should be satisfied with the success that attended it. A large turnout of the membership, male and female, for there is a companion court here, was swelled by a few friends and by a large contingent from Dromore Court, whose kindness and interest in Forestry, as shown by driving 12 miles to honor their invitation, was duly appreciated.

After ample justice had been done to the oysters and other viands, adjournment was made to the lodge room where, with a first class Chairman, Dr. Hutton, a fine program of speech and song was rendered. The chairman presented some fine Forestry facts, such as the provision for the benefit of the living member, the widely spread Order, the security of a big surplus, &c. He showed how the Order had grown from small beginnings up to present figure 181. He announced apologies from Bros. F. S. Mearns and Geo. Mitchell, but welcomed in their place Bro. Tovell, of Guelph, Dep. S. C. B., and Bro. Scott, of Toronto, High V. C. H.

Insp. Campbell gave a lucid address on "What constituted a good Forester," pointing out negatively what it was not and closing affirmatively by saying it was translating into action the motto of the Order, "Liberty, Benevolence and Concord."

Mr. Midford and Mr. Wm. W. Ramage at intervals gave solos which were honored by encores and later by votes of thanks. The former gave his patriotic piece "God Bless the King," and as encore "Give me the Leaves," which brought down the house. The latter prefaced "My An Fiesie" by a short address showing how Forestry protected the fireside. He referred to Dromore being an offshoot of Durham, were proud of their origin, though from their higher altitude they could look down on them. The fine old song was encored and "Rule Britannia" gave the audience a chance at the chorus.

Mr. Scott was extremely pleased to be there with fine people of Durham and stalwarts of the townships a beautiful town, with elegant side-walks and everything in the superlative degree. It was well to spread flowers before death. Spoke of the work of Supreme Chief Quonhyatakias as seen in the Orphan Home and elsewhere, and impressed on them the need of harmony.

Bro. Johnston gave thanks for all the kind things said of him, and urged all Foresters to make sure of their proof of birth papers.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Miss Irwin for the very able manner in which she accompanied the singers and "God Save the King," closed a fine gathering.

Death in the Blizzard

Alex Crawford the Victim

Friday evening last a heartrending telegram reached Mr J. W. Crawford here from his son-in-law, Mr Mortimer in Winnipeg, that his son had died in a storm and asking as to the disposal of the body. Mr Crawford wired to send the body east. Saturday morning another telegram came stating that the deceased's brother Peter and sister Birdie were coming east with the remains, but not stating when they would start. This is all the news that has been received up to Tuesday evening except that a Winnipeg paper states that the telegram was sent by Mr Mortimer in Winnipeg. We have read this winter already of death in the blizzard, but how little the mind is affected when the name is unknown! How different when one, who a few months ago walked the streets of his native town, is the victim! The gloom of the catastrophe is felt by many outside the home circle and great sympathy is felt for Mr and Mrs Crawford and family in this sore bereavement.

And similar sympathy will be extended to his widow, daughter of Mr and Mrs Geo Ryan, who, only a few months ago a bride, and devoted to her husband, sees now the hand of death "make cypress of her orange flower."

The funeral will take place the day after arrival here, the remains resting one night in the old home.

LATER—Wednesday morning comes a telegram that the body had not yet reached Battleford, which is 50 miles distant from his home. It is likely now that the remains will be interred in Battleford.
