Senator G. W. Ross

Announcement is made this week that the Hon G. W. Ross has been elevated to the Senate, thus again entering the Dominion arena which he left in 1883 to become Min. of Education in Mr Mowat's cabinet. Few if any appointments to this body have given more satisfaction, or will add more to its usefulness.

Though a defeated leader he still has the warm respect and sympathy of his party, who looked upon him as a victim of circumstances, and whose downfall was more his misfortune than his fault. Certain it is that the part he played in the development of Ontario educationally and otherwise, looms up so large that no future historian of our province can avoid seeing it.

To represent one constituency, West Middlesex, for 34 continuous years is a tribute to his personality as well as to his genius. In his new sphere of labor his eloquence and wisdom will give added zest to Senate proceedings, and none but will wish him many years of health to enjoy this new honor. The Senate as a whole, and the Liberal forces at Ottawa, in particular are strengthened by his presence.

Just who his successor will be known when parliament meets.

Other elevations to the Senate are Mr Robt Beth of Bowmanville, Hon John Costigan, M.P., and Mr Dauliel Gilmore from New Brunswick.

Local Option									
On Monday, in 111 municipalities of									
Ontario, electors were given an op-									
portunity to express their opinion									
on local option. This was the first									
practical test of the new legislation									
by the Whitney Government at last ses-									
sion of the Legislature, which calls for									
a three-fifths vote to bring this law in-									
to force. Despite this handicap, by-									
laws carried in quite a number of									
towns and townships.									
Toronto Junction was the center of									
the fight. Three years ago this town									
carried the measure by a majority of									
190, and on Monday the expression									
of the people with regard to the sat-									
isfaction with which it had worked									
during the three years, showed itself									
in a majority of 333, in favor of re-									
taining the measure.									
Some places in which the by-law									
carried by over the three-fifths ma-									
jority were Midland, Teeswater, Port									
Carling, Weston, Waterford, the									
Townships of Arran, Asphodel, Bruce,									
Cranhahe, Innisfil, Manvers, and									
Norwich. A number of municipalities									
gave a majority for local option, but									
not the required three-fifths. These									
include Bradford, Collingwood, Leam-									
ington, and Meaford.

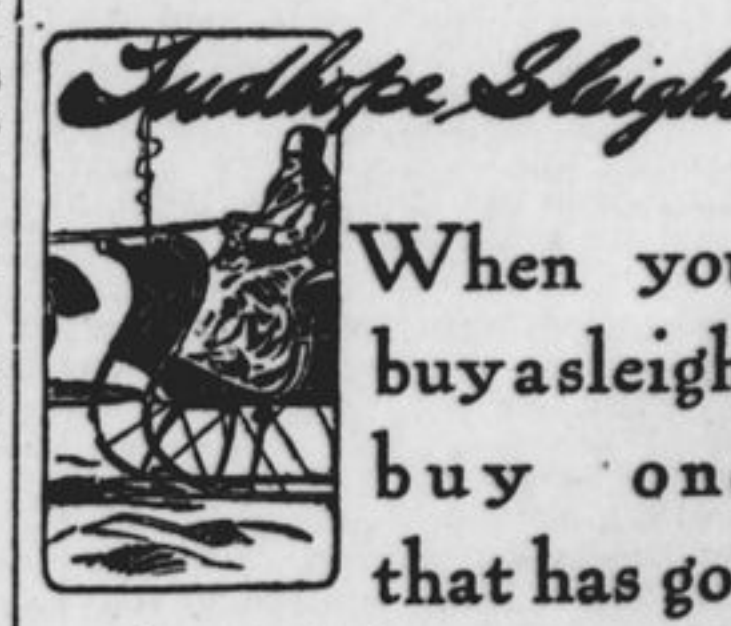
