Failing to implicitly obey orders is the snag on which more volunteer fire depts fall down then any other, and it is all nonsense to talk about treating them the same as a paid fireman, as long as human nature remains as it is, the volunteer chief must count good humor, tac and personal popularity, as his chief asset in handling and directing his

> Volunteer fire dept's very often have a very hard time in getting the apparatus to the scene of action ; this Mrs. A. Brown, Saskatoon, Sask.. who are in charge : ought not to be so. The fact is tha the work of the volunteer fireman but the active recognition of a public duty that every intelligent and able bodied man owes to his community. and no man is doing his whole duty as a citizen until he has tendered his services to his local fire department in a time of need, instead of standing on the hose chewing the rag. A very hard problem is to keep up interest and enthusiasm especially when fires are infrequent. This is not so hard to do if you have an attractive and inviting headquarters where you can have social amusements to hold the men together.
