The annual meeting of Amos Presbyterian church was held on the evening of Wednesday the 16th inst. The meeting was opened by colporteur Mr Perry in prayer and prayer. After there were to the chair when the various reports were read and passed upon. That of the session after a careful perusal of the roll by Mr Robt Renwick showed a present total membership of 182, after deduction 14 who were probably temporarily absent in the N. W.

This branch of the church's work contributed a total of \$113.60 during the year, the Women's Foreign Mission receiving \$88 the balance going towards a bale of clothing valued at \$25.00.

The C. E. report was submitted by Mr. Gordon Findlay and showed an active membership of 70, and associate members 24. \$87 had been realized during the year, a balance of \$39 still being in the treasury.

The treasurer's report which also included the managers as far as the finances go was given over verbatim by the treasurer, Mr John M Findlay.

The schemes of the church though not as high as in former years had not been reached on to a certain extent by the contribution to Queen's University and Japanese fund, a total of \$88.

The report showed a total of \$1012.66 available during the year, showing a balance on hand of \$140.43 and clear of debt and no work required for another year at least.

The choir report was given by Wm Ramsay who commented upon the inroads made on the choir through marriage, and intimated his readiness to receive applications for membership, and gave some qualifications for a successful chorister, such as a fairly good voice, a willingness to learn and above all an agreeability of manner.

Mr Perry expressed his pleasure with the agreeableness of the meeting such a contrast to some he has attended, and with the financial success as shown by the reports.

The following were elected as managers in place of those retiring: Messrs W J Eccles, J Scott & J Ferguson. It was resolved after a friendly discussion, that in the event of a probable induction an old time Soiree would be held, with an admission fee. A large delegation was appointed to attend the meeting of Presbytery to further advance the call to the Rev. Mr Kendall.
