County Council

The first meeting of the County Council elect of the County of Grey was held on Tuesday afternoon, with all the members in attendance, 37 in number. After they had filed their certificates and taken their seats, Clerk John Butherford took the chair and read the regulations governing the election of a warden after which he announced his readiness to receive nominations for the office.

The nominations were as follows; Mr R. J. Ball, nominated by Mr Preston; Mr Andrew Schenk nominated by Mr Hasie; Mr Robt Agnew nominated by Mr Eaton; and Mr H. Pedwell nominated by Mr McNight.

On the first vote Mr Pedwell got 14 votes, Mr Ball 9, Mr Schenk 9, and Mr Agnew 5.

Mr Agnew having withdrawn, the second vote stood, Pedwell 17, Ball 9 and Schenk 9.

Mr Schenk then withdrew, and the third vote was taken, which was final. Mr Pedwell receiving 13 votes and Mr Ball 16. The clerk therefore declared Mr Pedwell duly elected warden for 1907 and that gentleman was escorted to the chair by Messrs McNight and Stephenson. The warden elect expressed his thanks for the honor conferred on him and took the declaration of office as warden.

After reading the minutes of last meeting of November session, which were signed by the warden, the clerk read a budget of communications and accounts among which were a claim from Clinton High School for maintenance, applications from A. F. Armstrong, G. Binnie and Thos Wallace of Varney for the position of Co Auditor. Letters from Neil McCanell in reference to Pricessville bridge &c.

Messrs Preston, Stephenson, D. Sinclair, Schenk, Patterson, Ball, McKnight and Leslie were appointed a striking committee.

Wednesday morning Warden Pedwell made a brief inaugural address, in which he thanked the council for electing him to the wardenship, and expressed the hope that they would give him all assistance in fulfilling the duties of the office. He felt that he would require their help and he thought also that he could speak it for himself judging from the most earnest expression on his face. He could not refer at any length to the business which might come before the council during the year, amount of it was not yet in sight, but hoped it would be transacted in a harmonious manner. He fully appreciated the honor which had been conferred on himself and also on the municipality he represented by his election as Warden.

The clerk's budget was an unusually small one for this stage of the session and consisted of a few accounts and applications from Messrs G. M. Franklin of O. Sound and Jas S. Rowe of Markdale, to be appointed county auditors.

Mr D. E. Preston presented report of the Special Committee, appointed to strike the Standing Committees for the year. The report recommended as follows:

Warden's committee.—Messrs Agnew, Ball and Preston.

This report was adopted and then the warden called out the names of each committee whereupon the members as named retired into the Judge's room and elected their chairman. While the twelfth man had mistaken another name for his own, they being somewhat similar. When he left the room, a decision was soon made as to the chairman of the committee.

Mr Preston was elected chairman of Finance and Assessment; Mr Goldsmith chairman of Roads and Bridges; Mr Leslie chairman of County Property, Mr Ball chairman of Education; Mr Schenk, chairman of Printing; Mr Agnew, chairman of Communications and memorials, and Mr Stephenson chairman of the House of Refuge committee.

A report of the House of Refuge Committee left over from last year was also presented by Mr Preston, who with Mr Ball, are the only two members who survive from the council of last year. Mr Preston had therefore a great deal of explanation to give in connection with different items in the report, which was considered in committee with Mr Ball in the chair. Accounts for supplies to the house in 1906 due for bread \$204, wheat \$182,

groceries \$98 and an undertakers account from J. Chapman for five coffins and five funerals amounting to \$75. Another item was for a waggon box \$6.50. This Mr Preston explained was a large box which manager Hartness had made for hauling manure, as he bought the material by the load and wanted a large box in order to get good value. Some discussion took place over an item of \$7 for use of a grader on the driveway from street to house of refuge, and the item was declared to be an extravagant one. However the report passed without amendment and was finally adopted.

After adjournment until Thursday, arrangements were made for the meeting of all the committees on Wednesday afternoon.

The warden elect expressed his thanks for the honor conferred on him and took the declaration of office as warden.
