**That School Act. MORE COMPLAINTS.**  
 Mr. John Campbell, of Petherton, formerly of Boothville, has sent us the following re-olations, passed unan- imously at Drayton recently. Delega- tions were present from the townships of Minto, Arthur, Maryboro, Wallace and Peel. The meeting was called for the express purpose of taking ac- tion regarding the Public Schools' Act of 1906. The agitation seems to be general, and no doubt the Govern- ment will introduce modifications.  
 I That we disapprove of the com- pulsory payment of stated salary to teachers, and the arbitrary power given to inspectors to cancel the cer- tificate of any teacher who agrees to accept less than the minimum salary.  
 II That the regulation of salary on the basis of assessment and dis- tribution of the grant on basis of salary and equipment, is unfair to the smaller sections.  
 III That we disapprove of the com- pulsory equipment of rural schools by providing scales, measures, tape, library, teachers' private rooms, concrete walks, enlargement of grounds, &c.  
 IV That the section of the Act compelling County Councils to levy a rate for rural school purposes be elimi- nated.  
 V That we disapprove of the regu- lations regarding the training and qualifications of teachers, because the poorer class can have little hope of acquiring an education, although many of our brightest minds come from this class.  
 Thus a discrimination is created in favor of the rich against the poor.

**Rural School Regulations**  
 The amended rural school regu- lations proposed by Mr. Whitney are as follows:  
 (a) The minimum grant of \$300 per annum by the township to each school section for salary will be re- tained.  
 (b) An unconditional grant of \$15 per annum will be made to each section.  
 (c) A grant will be made for the purposes of equipment and accommo- dation, and  
 (d) A grant of 40 per cent will be made on the excess of all salaries above \$300 and up to \$600.  
 This will work out as follows: Appropriation for equipment and accom- modation, \$60,000; appropriation of \$15 to each section, \$80,000; ap- propriation of 40 per cent on salaries over \$300, \$240,000; a total in all of \$380,000.  
 The regulations adopted a year ago provided for minimum salaries ranging from \$350 to \$500, accord- ing to township assessments. The Government has practically re-vo- cated the salary clauses of its edu- cational act of last session. Its sur- render will be a blow to the teaching profession, but the Government has acted prudently from a party stand- point. The large increase in the grant to rural schools, while com- mendable in itself, would have come with better grace a year ago. The rural trustees and ratepayers have been irritated by the coercive fea- sures of the act, and may not be in the mood to respond as liberally as they ought to the inducements which are now held out to raise the scale of salaries.—Ex.

**The Canadian Press Association Continued Storms in North-West**  
 The 49th annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association was held in Toronto last week with a large attendance. The retiring President was Dep. Minister of Education Colquhoun, and his successor for the 50th and jubilee year of its existence is Mr. Joseph Clark, the versatile edi- tor of "Saturday Night," and with some claim to be called a Durham boy as he spent a few years of his boyhood in the Review office. Mr. David Williams, of Collingwood, son of the well-known Principal, is Vice- President and will likely get the first position next year. Mr. J. R. Bone, of the Star office, makes an obliging and efficient Secretary.  
 Questions of rates and commissions for foreign advertising, printing office insurance (thought to be excessive), postal charges and orders, clubbing rates, flat rates, souvenir numbers, patent insides, circulation book-keeping, &c., &c., were among the many subjects discussed. One of the ses- sions was honored with the presence of Mr. Goldwin Smith, himself a journalist of highest eminence and one of the oldest in Can da. Need less to say, he was warmly received. An informal dinner at McConkav's gave opportunity for after-dinner wit and eloquence, some of the speakers being Messrs. Willison, of the News-Atkinson, of the Star, opposition leader G. P. Graham, Hugh Clark, M. P. F., Mr. Hooken, leader in the fight against the Street Railway, and sev- eral prominent members. It was expected that Mr. Medill McCormick, of the Chicago Tribune, one of the leading publishers of America, would be present but illness prevented and a sub-editor, Mr. Harrison, came in his stead and gave some good points.  
 The Toronto brethren of the press entertained all who chose to a free ticket to the theatre, where Shake- speare's play of Cymbeline was on. Another banquet to the printers and a handsome one was the free trip to Niagara given by the G. T. R. on Saturday, free street cars there and an elaborate luncheon at the Clifton Hotel. Before and after the luncheon guides conducted parties of the vis- itors through the massive electrical works, power houses, &c., and no bet- ter treat was enjoyed for many a day. The vast wheel turbine and related machinery, with all the devices to keep out ice and let water in, was an eye-opener to the novice and a sur- prising illustration of the growth of mechanical and electrical science.  
 It seemed to us that the cry of de- pletion of Niagara waters by power works is almost absurd in the pres- ence of the rolling flood.  
 Niagara in winter is worth seeing with the icebanks formed by the spray and hoary surroundings gener- ally, and we would close by again thanking warmly the G. T. R. for their courtesy to the printers.
