The Germania

The Twenty-Ninth Annual Meeting of the Germania Fire Insurance Company was held in the town hall on Wednesday of last week the 8, inst. Manager Forstner took a step in advance of any management heretofore in connection with this institution, in having the Financial Statement mailed, a week or ten days prior to the meeting, to every policy holder of the Company. This was a commendable move as the people interested have then an opportunity of informing themselves on the work done during the past year and at the annual meeting may approve of or condemn such work. Prior to this, the statement was not handed out till after the meeting, and it a policy holder took objection to anything done by the management, he had no means of redress until the next annual meeting or until the matter perhaps had entirely escaped his memory.

The meeting was orderly and highly in accord with the work of the management the past year. Five hundred and ten policies were issued, which was thirty more than last year, and more than was issued in any year since the incorporation of the Company, not a single policy was lost in the township during the year. The cash in the bank shows an increase of about \$1000 over last year's business.

The Company, of course, was fortunate in being called upon to adjust only two serious losses by fire, one of which occurred on July 12 to Chas. McQueen's home, amounting to \$500, the other on Aug 25th to Otto Maes barn and contents, amounting to \$1200. Minor losses such as sheep, cattle and horses killed by lightning were more numerous than heretofore, the total, however, amounting to only \$2,480.10. This is a business of over \$100,000, put everyone interested in the concern in good humor.

The retiring Directors were Messrs A. Schenk, R. Morice, John Preiss and Adam Riva. The former are all local men, the latter is from Cliffton. They were all re-elected, except Mr Preiss, who on account of advancing years, tendered his resignation. Peter Colquhoun of Minno, was elected in his stead. The retiring Director has been connected with the institution in such capacity, for twenty six years, and was a staunch factor in making the company what it is to-day, one of the cheapest, surest and best managed of its kind doing business in the Province. Andrew Schenk was elected to his old position, that of President, Philip S. Schabus that of Vice President. The Executive Committee is composed of these two officers and Robert Morice, Chas. Forbes and Adam Widmeyer constitute the board of audit.

All the Directors, both local and from outside, were present, as well as many of the able staff of agents that has been appointed by the management. Among these latter were: Messrs W. J. Sharp, Holstein; Bobt Brigham, Allan Park; George Laverty, Harniss; H. Bender, Gowans; Adam Riva, Howick and others. After the business of the meeting was finished, the manager took directors and agents through the splendidly equipped head office of the Company, showed them the safe, in which all the papers, documents, etc., of the Company are kept in his fire-proof vault, and they all felt happy and confident that the Germania is in good hands, that it is advancing in popularity and safety, and each in his own local sphere will do his utmost to have a hand in the welfare and promotion of the Company during the coming year.

The Ontario Government received last year over \$200,000 in corporation fees, and \$30,000 during the month of January. The magnitude of these figures which greatly overshadow those of previous years, is due to the number of mining companies which have come into existence. How many of these wild-cat mining companies are able to pay their fees by imposing on a gullible public will never be known, but there seems at present a regular carnival of stock selling, every investor to become a millionaire, for every mine is the very best yet discovered.

Com'r Ferguson reported examining Registry office re Trass, -urities and found satisfactory; cost of search \$1.50 order granted to Registrar. Philip—McArthur—Report adopted, Com'r paid \$2.00—Carried.

Com'r Lothian reported under-billing, advised by W. L. Dixon 15th. at 100-15, cou 21.40 ft wide, 133 rds. 10 ct-per rod equals \$13.30. Ferguson—Philip—Report adopted, Com'r fees \$1.00—Carried.

Lothian—Ferguson—That the notes of Dr. Brown and Smith for \$5 each for certificate of lunacy to Mrs. Currie be paid—Carried. By-law No 207 to appoint collectors was passed. J. C. Adams was appointed for N. D. and D. Hunter for S. D., salary \$40 each.

By-Law No 208 to appoint an assessor was passed, David McIntyre was appointed, salary \$80.00. By-Law No 209 to appoint pathfinders and road Com'r received the usual readings, but will be published later.

By-Law No 210 to abolish Muir's road beat on E. & G. townline was passed. Said beat is now beat 5, cou. 21.22. McArthur—Ferguson—That the auditors report be adopted as read, and they be paid \$10 each for their services, and that 200 copies be printed—Carried.

Resolved that the following acts be paid: Muir's World, Ass'n rolls, etc., and 20 school debentures \$13.41. W. B. Sutton express charges 50 c. Wm. Aljos, gravel 40c.

Adjourned to meet on Tuesday, May 28th, as a court of revision and other business.

A Trip through Wellington

DEAR EDITOR.—Taking advantage of the fine weather of last week and making up our minds quickly for a trip to Guelph, we pen you a few notes taken by the way that may prove of interest to some of your readers. Going through the Township of Egremont the character of the rivers were noted, not being in season as is the case through Wellington Co. The former are fed largely by springs, accounting for their open appearance and but water of the finest quality. The south end of the township of Egremont is hilly like the north with a fine level country between.

Entering Arthur township on the Riverview concession we pass some fine farms with the buildings not quite up to the township level, being mostly frame and small, at that. The Garafax road being reached a better class shows up many of the barns being surrounded by power windmills some of which showed the effects of the recent wind-storm. Reaching Kenilworth we passed the fine Catholic church and School there, and proceeded down the Garafax where many thousands of dollars worth of farm produce used to be teamed in the early days to Guelph and where not a bush of rye was to be had now to break the wind the entire distance. Many farms not appearing to have their firewood itself.

We come to Petherton P. O., that reminds us of old friends: Mr. John Campbell and his family, late of Boothville but now within 3 miles of Arthur; Egremont friends will be glad to learn they are meeting with prosperity. Having an additional 50 acres and the farm being watered by running stream and spring, he is enabled to keep a fine lot of thoroughbred stock for breeding purposes in both cattle and hogs. He has lately erected a windmill over the spring, which supplies a tank in the barn, a pipe from which leads to the house with the best of water. The lightning striking the ground within a short distance and between the barn and a tree, induced him to have his fine buildings (which are carrying over \$5000 of insurance) added at considerable cost. He has also added to his list of machines, the chief of which is a hay loader. He proves still to be a factor in politics in his neighborhood and recently fathered a motion condemnatory of the objectionable school act at a meeting held in Drayton, and can make it hot for any bumptious politician.

Further on, near Cummer, we had the pleasure of meeting with a far away descendant of the famous Jenny Lind, in poses on of the same name as the illustrious "nightingale" and having herself a very fine musical voice. We enjoyed several fine selections, he high notes being taken without apparent effort and with a clearness seldom met with except in some professionals.

The Ferguson family, known to some in North Egremont, are still living in Ferguson but contemplating a move up to New Ontario in the spring where the seven sons and their mother hold 1280 acres of good land. John is a successful High School teacher in Ferguson.

Guelph was duly reached after an uneventful journey. Some old friends were found here, who seem to enjoy their residence in the royal city. Mrs. Butler (nee Janet Burgess) and family are well. Mr and Mrs Phillips (nee Adams) who have relatives in Egremont and Durham, were met with latter having remarkably improved from her recent illness. The farm was visited and a profitable, as well as pleasant, time was spent viewing it in all its departments, being devoid of the crash of an excursion day.

While we were in the city an article which we have no doubt would prove of interest to you, which is old to us, was a 2 1/2 hp air-cooled gasoline engine, a regular Hercules, occupying a space about 2 ft by 4 ft. x 25 in. high, a horizontal machine and simple in its action. It is handled for the firm by T. C. Rogers, one of Holstein.

We close by recommending as a thing of pleasure a winter visit to the farm.
