The Hyman Resignation.

A great deal of interest was taken in the Dominion House last week over Mr. Hyman's resignation of his seat in London. The Premier made a forceful speech giving all the information in his competency to give and completely put the opposition at sea by his tactful offer to refer the whole matter to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. Mr. Bennett, E. Simcoe made a violent attack on Mr. Hyman charging duplicity in the matter of his illness, &c.

His ill-tempered speech drew from Mr. H. H. Miller, M. P., what the Globe calls "a forcible and effective reply." We give it in full:

"Mr. Miller said it seemed to him that such a speech as that they had just listened to was ill-becoming and not befitting a man who had stood up in a moment of anger, excitement or weakness. 'We bought you once and can buy you again.' (Liberal cheers.) He was scarcely the man who could come and lecture them about the political methods of that Province or of any other. He recalled to the minds of the Opposition what took place in East Elgin, his Judge Cotter said two women of immoral character were imported into that riding to injure the character of an innocent man, and declared that there was just as much evidence to connect the member for East Elgin with that notorious plot as there was to connect Mr. Hyman with the payment of any money in the city of London. When men in the Conservative party were willing to believe every breath of scandal that came from any source they would always have slanders about. (Liberal cheers.) He repeated there was nothing to connect Mr. Hyman with the expenditure of one cent illegally, any more than there was to connect Mr. Marsball with the terrible state of affairs that had in East Elgin, and he wanted to know whether the member for East Simcoe (Mr. Bennett), or any other Conservative, was asking the member for East Elgin to take the manly course that Mr. Hyman had followed in London? (Liberal cheers.)"

Preparations are now well advanced for the great Imperial Conference to meet in London about the middle of April. Australia, New Zealand and Cape Colony have all suggested topics for discussion at the invitation of the British Government, but Canada, though receiving a similar invitation, has made no suggestions, and thus Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues go quite non-committal. Looks a little churlish, but Canada will not be found behind in all that pertains to empire solidarity.

Quite a tempest is on in Toronto license circles owing to certain charges of \$1000 bribe being offered to Commissioners for favors. One Hynes charges Dr. Beattie Nesbit with using his influence for financial considerations. The Whitney Government has appointed a commission to investigate.
