Town Treasurer. It appears Mayor and Council have been served by a notice from Lucas, Wright and McArdle, at the instance of Treas. A. H. Jackson, pointing out the illegality of the proceedings at a recent meeting of council. It will be remembered they advertised for applications for the position of Treasurer and appointed Mr. W. H. Bean Treasurer at a salary of \$100 a year. This, it is claimed, is illegal because they had neither dismissed the former incumbent nor asked for his resignation. Mr. Jackson has been legally advised to hold on to the books till one or other of these alternatives is done, so it is up to the council to unravel the tangled skein.

Then the double vote of the Mayor on the salary question is objected to as conflicting with the Statutes of 1903 which says that when there is an equality of votes the question is negatived. This being a question of law, it is up to the Mayor to give his authority for the privilege of his double vote, or this action too becomes void and things remain as they were before that meeting.

The By-law appointing Mr. Bean appears to rest on a shaky foundation, and council and citizens are likely to learn some municipal law. Council meets on Monday evening next.

A RUSH FOR LANDS—The Dominion government has introduced a bill relating to lands in the Northwest, that will create a rush for government lands. This bill sets free about 2000,000 acres of land, the odd numbered 600 acres of the odd numbered sections, that up till now have been tied up by the Railway companies, and the lands were granted by the late government to aid and encourage railway construction amounting in all to \$2,000,000 acres. This land has been tied up until the railways had made a selection of the lands they preferred. This selection has been completed so that there is no longer any need of tying up the odd numbered sections that remain for settlement. The present bill declares that any of the odd numbered sections that have not already been passed into the hands of the railways, shall be available for free homesteading. Most of these are in Saskatchewan and Alberta. The bill also provides that when a settler enters for a quarter section, he can purchase adjoining lands at a price not less than \$3 an acre. All this means that the man who is on the spot first, and buy at a low rate, enough land in a day to make himself rich. Say won't there be a rush this spring.—Ex.
