The Meaning of W. Middlesex.

Under the above heading the Globe of Thursday last refers to the victory of Mr. Duncan C. Ross, son of the late premier, in his father's old constituency. The majority is 145, more than his father got. Here are the Globe's remarks:

The Liberals in the Legislature were a very jubilant band when the returns from West Middlesex came in last night, showing that Mr. Duncan C. Ross had carried the seat, so long held by his distinguished father. Mr. Whitney had undoubtedly given instructions that the riding should be won at all costs. He smarted under the loss of the late Mr. Carscallen's seat in Hamilton to the Labor party, and because of the Conservative failure to carry any Liberal seat since the general election. Into the constituency he sent Messrs. Hanna, Beck, Downey, Gamey, Macdonald, Pattinson, Neely and other spall-binders, with a host of lesser fry. The result of it all is an increased Liberal majority, and the natural inference that many a normally Liberal seat will return to the old love when the general election comes on.

Against the Whitney hosts only three Liberal members of the Legislature went out: Messrs. G. P. Graham, A. G. MacKay and C. N. Smith. When the result was announced this message was sent: "D. C. Ross, M. P. P., Opera House, Strathroy: Heartly congratulations from the Liberal Parliamentary party in Toronto. We would like to be with you to-night. (Signed) A. G. MacKay, C. N. Smith."

Mr. Ross in reply thanked the members for their great services, and later Mr. W. S. Calvert, M. P., wired to Mr. Smith: "It looks like 146 majority. Cheers for Graham, MacKay and Smith."

Maple Sugar Industry.

For the purpose of distributing a Bulletin on the manufacture of pure maple syrup and sugar, the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has undertaken to collect a list of Maple Sugar Makers from each County in the Dominion. If by chance any names of sugar makers, or any interested in the manufacture, have been omitted from the list, or the copy already mailed has gone astray, the Department will be glad to send to all who apply, or to anyone who may wish to send in a list of names with P. O. addresses, a copy of the Maple Sugar Bulletin just issued.

This Bulletin not only deals with the manufacture of "Pure Maple Syrup and Sugar," but also explains the Sections of the Adulteration Act having reference to Maple Syrup and Sugar and like ingredients, and gives a "Form of Warranty" which has to be signed by the sugar-maker himself and handed on to the wholesaler, retailer and consumer, thus giving the purchaser assurance that the goods sold as "Pure Maple Syrup" or "Pure Maple Sugar" are what they are represented to be.
