City Council.

The Council met February 28th, 1907, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the mayor in the chair. Minutes of meeting held January 14th and the special meeting of January 14th read and approved. Communications read as follows: From the mayor as chairman of the committee appointed to examine and report upon the new road proposed to be built by the Walkerton and Lucknow Railway Co., also from the mayor as chairman of committee appointed to examine as to the efficiency of the security given by the treasurer; from the auditors their report; from Wm. Hampton, Esq., reeve of Holland, re Walker deviation; from the Ontario Municipal Association re Section 606 of Municipal Act.

Hunt-Weir—That this Council comply with the request of the Ontario Municipal Association by petitioning the Legislature to amend Section 606 of the Municipal Act, and relieve municipalities from a portion of their present heavy responsibility for the non-repair of highways, and that Dr. Jamieson, M. L. A., our representative in the house, be requested to present the petition and support the bill when it comes before the House for consideration.—Carried.

Hunt-Black—That ward commissioners be appointed as follows: Ward 1 Wm Weir, Ward 2 J. A. McMillan, Ward 3 Malcolm Black, Ward 4 E. W. Hunt, and that Thos. McFadden be supervisor for townships and other bridges.—Carried.

By-Law No. 478 for the appointment of township officers was introduced and read a first and second time.

Moved by Mr. Weir, seconded by Mr. Hunt, that the Auditor's report as read by the council be adopted, and that the auditors be paid \$9 each for their services.—Carried.

Weir-Hunt—That Jas. McGillivray be paid 75 cents for repairing road at lot 3, con. 3, N. D. B.—Carried.

Hunt-Black—That By-Law No. 478 for the appointment of township officers be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-Law book.—Carried.

Hunt-Black—That Thos. Lander be paid \$2 for registering school debentures and 75 cents for searches re treasurer's sureties, and that the reeve be paid \$1 for services re search.—Carried.

Hunt-Black—That the report of the reeve and Wm. Weir, the committee appointed to inspect the proposed new road to be built by the Walkerton and Lucknow Railway Co., be adopted and that they be paid \$1 each for their services.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to April 13th at 10 a. m. J. S. BLACK, Clerk.

Ontario V. Manitoba Flour.

We, in Ontario, are much to blame for this. Our farmers raise too little wheat, and what little is raised, is sold outside the province in either wheat or flour.

How much better to grow Ontario wheat, sell Ontario wheat, buy Ontario flour, and keep all this money at home among our own people. It means not only money saved, but it also means giving our wives and mothers and sisters better flour for their baking. It is a fact that a blend of Ontario wheat, with a little Manitoba flour, makes the best all-round flour that can be milled. In the open markets of the world—in Great Britain, in Europe, in the United States—the blended flours command the highest prices. Down in Nova Scotia, and in fact throughout the Maritime Provinces blended flours are properly appreciated and used in preference to all others.

Our farmers should get the idea out of their heads that there is no money in Ontario wheat. There is a steady and increasing demand for prime Ontario wheat, and wheat nets an excellent profit. The demand regulates the supply. With more Ontario flour being used, more wheat will be grown. Our farmers will plant larger wheat fields, harvest larger crops, and make more money.

The whole Province will share in the benefits. On the prosperity of the farmer, depends the prosperity of the nation. And the prosperous community is the one that is able to live within itself and selling to its neighbors its surplus, and to buy from them only that which they can supply to better advantage.
