Institute Meeting at Dromore

Mr Wm Allan acting as chairman expressed his pleasure at the standing of Egremont township, and its advantage in having two meetings held here, to some of the other townships one or none. He commented on the high standing of the township's show, of the farmer's standing in the raising of horses, cattle and sheep, in favorable comparison to other townships, and believed that every member should have a chance in getting to Fat Stock Show, Directors having their expenses paid.

Mr Wm Elliott on The Cultivation of the soil admitted that he did not know all about cultivation, but hoped his remarks would draw out other opinions that might benefit others. He spoke on the composition of soils and the necessity for fine pulverization, and advocated in the great majority of cases the system of shallow cultivation for the retention of moisture.

By the application of manure in winter and dising or spring-toothing it in spring rather than plowing, gave best results in the fertilizing of the soil, the decomposing of the manure raising the temperature six or seven degrees. A lighter coating of manure is recommended, from 8 to 10 loads per acre, and go over it oftener.

A 3-year rotation was recommended: one section put to roots, corn and rape; 2nd year sown to grain crops and seeded down; 3rd year clover crop, thus giving two manurings in three years. He urged the importance of keeping down weeds, especially the sow thistle which he declared worse than couch grass.

Mr John Philp read a paper on the application of manure, showing the increased value of manure from clover in comparison with straw. Liquid manure was more valuable than the solids and should be retained by having cut straw bedding and close cement floors. All manures should be mixed for best results in prevention of fermentation and distributing of valuable ingredients contained in the various kinds. Application of manure in winter preferable to summer in that it saves time.

Mr Buchanan spoke on the work of the Experimental Union, more particularly the Ontario branch. In the first year while only 12 experimenters were to be had, there are now 5000. The speaker gave a lucid description of the manner in which to conduct and report these experiments and concluded by giving a description of their annual meetings held the first two days of the fat stock show.

Secy Binnie quoted the terms for procuring the different papers and announced that the annual excursion would take place on the 8th of June.

The Ladies' meeting was well attended, some thirty being present. Miss G. Gray, Toronto, was the speaker of the occasion.

EVENING MEETING

Mr Buchanan in a few interesting things about plants asked "where do flowers come from?" The cultivated plants are the result of man's intelligence and skill; there were a great many kinds and all classified as "plants." The potato family by cultivation and improvement for the development of the tuber, has practically lost all power to produce seed, though the flower still greets the eye. There was a whole world of entertainment about us on the farm, had we but eyes and ears to receive it, more than can possibly be had in any town. A knowledge of plants was not only useful but was an interesting and fascinating study.

Miss G. Gray dealt with "Science in the Home." A nation's greatness does not depend on its riches or strength of armies but on the stability and upright character of its homes. We must all wake to the fact, that we must study our work. She spoke a good word for the Schools of Domestic Science, advocated proper ventilation and sanitation, commended the study of home nursing, cooking, laundrying &c. all on the curriculum at the McDonald Institute.

Mr Elliott believed if men were more interested in the ladies' meetings, the ladies would become interested in ours. His talk on "Choosing an Occupation," brought out: that to be a successful farmer one must have knowledge pertaining to his work. Many professionals unable to save a cent who feel they must live up to their surroundings. The evolution of time will make new ideas in all professions and present day men, unless progressive, must eventually be left behind. A better knowledge of our work will save us many mistakes and lead us to see that there is no more noble occupation than that of the farmer.

At intervals during the evening musical contributions were made by Messrs Wm Ramage and Wm Isaac in solos and duets, and a recitation was given by Mr Archie Clark "Experience of a farmer with a lightning rod agent", which amused the house.
