Electric Railroad to Dromore.

A largely attended meeting of the ratepayers of this north end of the township was held in Russell Hall on Friday evening last, when Messrs. Wm Eastle and John Hewitt, farmers from the vicinity of Egerton in Protest, addressed the audience. The former, after expressing his sentiment of affection and regard for those present, many of whom had been his early schoolmates, explained how steps came to be taken in bringing about the present prospects of a railway, and showed up some of the advantages to be derived from having an electric road, not the trolley kind, but one run by the third rail system, the first of the kind in the Dominion, though many railways in the States have and are adopting this and replacing steam.

To Mr. Hewitt fell the greater task of describing the benefits to be had in increased accommodation, cheap fares, facility to get on or off at any crossing or crossroad, power for lighting and heat for the farm, sidings, and two or three miles for the loading of stock or heavy merchandise, &c., on petition of 5 or 6 ratepayers.

He met with some opposition at times from merchants who realized the ease with which customers could get on and do their shopping at other large centres, deprecating the probability and showing the benefit it had been to the people of Egerton and Galt and Preston in being able to go to Toronto for their goods by the electric road recently built there. They had spent considerable time and money in furthering the project gratuitously, feeling that they would be amply repaid by the increased value of their property. The Co. would want, not a bonus? but the cost of the right of way and the necessary fencing.

A large and influential committee were appointed to aid in locating and securing and giving information as follows: Messrs Walker Hasting, the chairman of the meeting, Councilors Lothian and Philip R. Renwick, J. C. Adams, Dr. Sneath, J. Swanston, C. McInnes.

Canadian Northern.

To the Editor of the Durham Review

Dear Sir,—

I beg to enclose you herewith a copy of a Bill entitled "An Act respecting the Canadian Northern Railway Company." The Bill likely will be considered at next meeting of the Railway Committee and will doubtless be passed by the House in due course. You will see that the Bill is one authorizing the Canadian Northern to construct a number of railway lines in Ontario, the first of which is described as "from a point on its authorized line near Washago to a point on Lake Huron at or near Kincairdine," and that the seventh clause of the Bill is for the construction of a line "from a point on Lake Erie west of Fort Colborne, Northern past and through Brantford or Berlin to a point on the Georgian Bay."

The Minister of Railways asked that the Bill might stand over from the last meeting of the Committee that the Company might amend the Bill to more definitely fix the termini of the several branches but the map submitted by the Railway Company showed a line running from Washago south westerly to Barrie and thence westerly through Durham Hanover and Walkerton to Kincairdine and another line from O. Sound southerly through Durham, Mount Forest, Berlin, Paris, Brantford and Port Dover.

It would thus appear that our country is likely to very soon be well supplied with railway accommodation.
