JOSEPH ATKINSON, SR. On Sunday morning last at the ripe age of 84, the above gentleman breathed his last at the home of his son Jos, where he mostly made his residence. ANNUAL MEETING South Grey Liberal Association.

Thursday last, 28 February, under ideal conditions of roads and weather the annual meeting of the above body was held in the Town Hall, here. The attendance was not large, as at nominating conventions, but it was representative in character, estimates placing it at from one hundred and fifty to two hundred. The uncertainty surrounding the coming of leader Graham and A. G. MacKay M. P., gave no encouragement to booming the meeting and that there was so many present was reckoned encouraging.

Laying aside the disappointment over the inability of the two speakers named to be present, the general verdict was "no meeting is a failure when Miller is present" and at the close of his fine speech everyone was ready to admit the meeting was a great success.

President J. P. Telford in the chair, after reading regretful excuses from Graham and MacKay as to their absence, launched out into a very good speech, making flattering references to Mr Miller's work at Ottawa. He referred to the circumstances of the last election and considering the turnover in the county thought S. Grey had done well to reduce the large majority against them. He then announced his intention of resigning the Presidency of the association, thinking it an anomaly to hold such a position and occupy the position of Police Magistrate under a government of a different stripe.

He then called for nomination of officers and the following are the new officials:

- President—Neil McCannell. 1st Vice Pres—Dugald McKinnon, Chesley, (Sullivan.) 2nd Vice Pres.—Geo. Binnie, Bunnessan. Secy.—Treas—C. Ramage.

Members of Executive, one from each municipality:

- Glenelg—Wm Weir, Durham Bentinck—D. McDougall, Macklock. Normanby—R. Morice Durham Egremont—W. Hastie, Dromore Proton—Wm McMurdo, Hopeville. Sullivan—Wm Mair, Mooreburg.

Hanover—J. S. Knechtel Durham—J. P. Telford Dundalk—J. D. Morgan. President appointed Messrs John H. Hunter and John Clark, auditors.

The new President then took his position and in a brief address thanked them for the honor conferred upon him.

Brief addresses were then given by A. Winger, G. McKechnie, G. Binnie, A. McCuaig, J. D. Morgan. D. McKinnon, of Sullivan, was also requested to a peak but declined to take up time from Mr Miller.

At the close of Mr McKechnie's address in which he pointed out the difficulty that governments have in legislating to please all sections of our broad country, he moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr G. Binnie: "That this association desires to place on record its appreciation of and confidence in the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and of the valuable and effective work of our representative, Mr H. H. Miller, M. P., in the Legislative Halls at Ottawa. The high measures of constructive statesmanship the country has witnessed are something to be proud of. The prosperity prevailing, the buoyant revenues, the wonderful success of immigration work are in no small measure due to the wise, prudent and progressive policy, outlined and pursued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his associates. We hope they may long be continued in a position to give the country similar good service." The resolution was heartily carried.

At the close of Mr Morgan's address he moved the following resolution:
