### ANNUAL MEETING

#### South Grey Liberal Association.

(Continued from page 1.)

tion seconded by C. Ramage. That this Liberal association of South Grey expresses its confidence in the Opposition in the Legislature of Ontario, under the able leadership of Hon. Geo. P. Graham, and hopes that in the near future with greatly increased strength they may have ample opportunity to carry out the measures outlined so clearly by the new leader in the House and in the country. We are with him especially in his condemnation of the arbitrary features of the School Act and in his determination to wage war on the spoils system, and have been gratified at the hearty support given him by his colleagues in the House and by leading and thoughtful men in the country. This also was heartily carried and Mr Miller was called on.

Mr Miller then entered upon his speech, which on all hands was voted a clear, masterly exposition of both Provincial and Dominion questions. He dealt first with Provincial affairs and Leader Graham himself could scarcely have done better. In Dominion issues he is thoroughly posted, being a working member, chairman of the committee of Banking and Commerce, and other positions and work also falling to his share. We venture to say that no member more worthily earns his indemnity than does South Grey's able M. P. and we are betraying no secret when we say that in some quarters he is looked upon as likely to rise to a cabinet position. While busily engaged in national affairs, there are services in the riding which carry the speaker in request is ever unheeded, and many a cause and claim has been adjusted through his efforts.

He began by regretting the absence of the two speakers expected and thanked them for the flattering resolution: modestly disclaiming the reference to himself he said the Dom. Government were worthy of all that could be said of them. He dealt then with Provincial affairs and thought the Whitney Government had obtained power under false pretences. Liberals who voted for their candidates had cut a gad for their own backs and instanced the arbitrary nature of some parts of the school Act. He referred to the glaring introduction of the spoils system, condemned by some conservative papers, and the departure from the sound British principle of government by majority, as seen in the requirement of three fifths majority to carry local option. The partisan trafficking in hotel licenses in Toronto had led the Telegram, a Conservative paper to say, that the Conservative party should make good their threat to show up delinquents alleged to exist.

He paid a striking eulogy to Hon. G. W. Ross: farmers lost power by the exchange of Ross for Whitney; for with him went Hon. John Dryden by far the ablest Min. of Agriculture the province has seen. The present government have found the surplus they used to charge was a bogey, their revenues were swelled to day by the Succession Duties, something they bitterly opposed. The glories of Cobalt and the Ontario Government Railway were due to the wise action of Hon. G. W. Ross and his Liberal associates.

Their tampering with the mining laws was bringing upon them the wrath of the miners, the 3-5ths clause had offended the temperance sentiment of the country, while the whole of country was in a ferment over the invasion of municipal and section rights in the matter of schools.

Leader Graham was a man of clear reputation, too clever to have swelled head, and it was not beyond the reach of the country to have a change of government at next election considering the ability of the opposition leader and the record of the Whitney government already. After reference to the victory of Duncan C. Ross, in spite of great efforts to defeat him, as an omen of coming Liberal successes he branched off into Dominion affairs.

The difficulty surrounding the coal duty was no light one, relief to Nova Scotia and Brit. Columbia, was burden to Ontario and vice versa. Several caucuses had considered the question, but he said without hesitation that never once was it taken into account how their retention or abolition would affect the Reform party. This was a big country having many interests to consider, and requiring no narrow statesmanship to guide its legislation.

He gave a vivid account of a mid-night session and a day's work in parliament, by no means the snop it is popularly supposed to be. In reference to the indemnity he did not expect to be any better off at the end than at the beginning of his parliamentary career, even with \$2500.

The great increase of expenditure, without material increase of debt was made possible by the abounding revenue. Increased expenditure did not necessarily mean extravagance. It was a fallacy to say the Laurier government was in the grip of corporations—the passing of the Sunday bill proved that. He was sure no one opposed Laurier on account of his religion: Mr Shearer testified that the Catholics Laurier and Fitzpatrick stood firm with the alliance against corporations, steamship cos., &c.

After expressing pride in their confidence, and his intention to merit a continuance of it, he took his seat amid great applause, which indeed had been drawn forth frequently by his eloquent periods.

A motion by G. McKechnie—J. W. Walls that the special hearty thanks of this meeting be given to Mr Miller for his lucid and able treatment of public questions, was heartily carried.
