Dr. Oronhyatekha.

A great man has passed away. While at Savannah, Georgia, in search of health, Death called on the great Indian chief, Oronhyatekha.

The deceased was a remarkable man, a full-blooded Mohawk Indian, proud of his race. He first came into prominence in 1860, when at the age of 19 he was chosen to read the address of the Indians to the then Prince of Wales, now King Edward.

He early became interested in Fraternal Society work, rose to prominence in Good Templar and other organizations, but his whole force of recent years has been given to the I. O. Foresters, which all admit he brought from a low estate to rank the first in the land.

He was a clever physician, an eloquent speaker, and all who knew him acknowledged his magnetism. He had a rare fund of humor and frequently turned the laugh on the "white man" in his addresses and used to boast he was an ally not a subject of King Edward.

Many warm tributes have been paid to his memory by prominent men. He will be buried beside his Indian wife at Deseronto, and a son, Dr. Acland Oronhyatekha, and a daughter, Mrs. Johnson, are the chief mourners.

The Toronto Star thus refers to him: The success of Dr. Oronhyatekha was due to the fact that he was an all-round, well-balanced man. He had heart and imagination, as well as intellect, to qualify him for leadership.

With his fine physique, his power of attracting men, his gay, kindly, and yet dignified manner, he might have been a great political leader if he had chosen that field of activity. But perhaps the choice he did make was the wisest possible, for it was one in which business sagacity was hardly more important than insight into human nature, and all those qualities that make a man loved as well as respected.

In Canada the relations between the race to which Dr. Oronhyatekha belonged and our own have always been good: it is a page of our history of which we need not be ashamed. But we ought not to give all the credit for those good relations to the white man. The race that has given allies and leaders in war and peace has qualities deserving of the highest regard.

The Son of the Morning was not only one of the greatest of the Indian race, but one of the greatest of Canadians of any race, an example worthy to be studied by all who desire to do useful service to their country and their fellow-men.

Local Option. The Pioneer gives the following as the complete returns of the recent local option contests in Ontario: Repeat contests, 8. New contests, 100; total 108. Victories of temperance people: Repeat contests, 7. New contests, 42; total 49. Eighty-three more barrooms to be closed May 1st.

Victories of liquor people: Repeat contests, 1. New contests, 13; total 14. Contests lost to temperance people because of 50 per cent majority demanded by the new law, 45. The majorities in those places on 50 per cent basis totalled 2,655. Of 800 municipalities in Ontario over 300 are now under local option.

Town Council.

Regular monthly meeting was held on Monday night. Owing to the absence of Mayor Calder through illness, Reeve Saunders took the chair, councilmen all present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted, except that minute passing by Law 525, which related to the appointment of Mr Bean as Treasurer. This, owing to the doubts surrounding the legality of the proceedings was held over. Mr Jackson is still Treasurer and has an opinion from the provincial Secretary's department that the use made of the double vote by the mayor was illegal, while the town solicitor has sent the council a letter pointing out that the vote was legal.

A number of accounts were passed. Mr Jas Falkingham lodged a complaint against certain parties blocking the street with poles almost hindering his entrance. Council promised to remove grievance.
