Mr. Thos. Martin, M. P. for N. Wellington, underwent an operation in the hospital at Ottawa, but this did not save his life for he died there on Tuesday at the age of 58. Mr. Forest and many beyond his own constituency will mourn the untimely removal of the genial "Tom" Martin. He was a public-spirited citizen and was having a useful career in Parliament. His is the seventh death during the present session of parliament.

The funeral took place on Tuesday at the English Church cemetery, Rev. Mr. Bice being the officiating clergyman. He was buried under the auspices of the Orange Order, of which he was a devoted member.
