Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met in the town hall, Fiesherton, March 2, 1907. Present, Messrs. Muir, Meads, Carson, McLoughry and McKenzie. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

The following communications were read: W. T. Meads and others asking for the formation of a new union school out of part of S S No 8 with part of the township of Osprey. Connor, Clark & Monds re cement bridges. J. A. Hearl account for repairs to grader 1906. L. O. L. No 1118, account for use of hall as polling booth for last Ontario election. By-law 679 to appoint overseers, pond-keepers and fenceviewers, No 680 to appoint a treasurer and No. 681 to raise by debentures \$3000 for the police village of Fiesherton for cement sidewalks, were introduced and read a first time.

Meads—Carson—that by-law 679, 680 and 681 be now read a second time.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That council go into committee on by-laws 679, 680 and 681.—Carried.

Council went into committee with Mr McKenzie in the chair. Committee rose, Mr McKenzie presented by-laws 679, 680 and 681 as filled up.

McKenzie—Carson—That by-law 680 to appoint treasurer as reported by committee be now read a third time, signed sealed and entered in by-law book and No 679 be laid over until next session of council.—Carried.

Meads—McKenzie—That by-law 681 to authorize a loan of \$3000 for the police village of Fiesherton be advertised in the "Fiesherton Advance" newspaper the required time and posted up and submitted to the qualified electors of the said police village for their approval, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of April, 1907, according to law.—Carried.

Mead—Carson—That the account of A. A. Meads re repairs to grader in 1906 \$49.25 be paid.—Carried.

McLoughry—Carson—That L O L 1118 be paid \$2.50 for use of hall as polling booth at last provincial election.—Carried.

Meads—Carson—That Alex McArthur be refunded \$2 for statute labor charged in error on his lots in Priceville in 1906.—Carried.

Carson—McLoughry—That R Plant be paid \$15 for five cords of wood.—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That Robert Best be paid \$1 for attending and letting work near Lucks mill on account of washout.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That the reeve is hereby authorized to employ an engineer per time for a week to examine the location of Bovus bridges and have plans and specifications in proper form to advertise in the Contract Record or other papers so that the work may be done in the proper season.—Carried.

Meads—McKenzie—That this council ask for man to operate grader for season of 1907, tenderers to state experience and wages wanted, the same to be in by April 6.—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That the report of committees appointed to confer with Proton Council relative to drain near Proton Station be received and the committee be paid \$4 each for their services in attending meetings at Dundalk and Proton.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the petition of W. T. Meads and nine others who are desirous of forming a new union school section out of part of S S No 8, Artemesia, with part of the township of Osprey and requesting appointment of an arbitrator in the matter, be laid over until next meeting of this council.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
