

A translator must devote his life to the work, as did Bishop Schereschewsky. This remarkable Bible scholar, although well-nigh helpless physically through incurable paralysis, for over fourteen years "pounded" on the typewriter with the solitary forefinger whose use he retained, preparing every word of both Testaments for his monumental translation into the Easy Wen Li dialect of Chinese, thus making our Bible accessible to scores of millions of people who speak that tongue. Will it be believed that Bishop Schereskewsky sat in the very same chair for nearly twenty years, working with amazing persistence, and requiring two secretaries to keep pace with him? 
