Two Hundred and Fifty Millions to be Left to Educacional and Charitable Objects-New York to Get \$50,000.

New York, March 25 .- The Herald says that, according to a member of John D. Rockefeller's Bible class, and who is also a personal friend of John D. Rockefeller, and in a position to know of his affairs, the latter proposes soon to make a princely gift to the city of New York. It will amount to at least \$50,000,000. It will be partly charitable and partly educational.

It is said that the oil king's will sal astonish the world when it is made public. It will, it is declared, donate no less than \$250,000,000 for charitable and educational purposes, and it would be so bestowed that the benefit therefrom will almost be perpetual.

'The manner in which these bequests will be bestowed is said to be mainly educational and charitable. While there are some contributions for religious purposes, it is stated that Mr. Rockefeller does not think it necessary to extend any great financial aid to churches. To his manner of thinking, the churches are growing stranger and stronger, and there is no danger that they will ever need any great financial assistance from one man.

"It is said that there is scarcely a man, woman or child that will not benefit in some way by these prospective donations."

Notwithstanding the inducements of food, both the Spanish and Italian Governments were opposed to allowing their subjects to go to Panama. The objections of the Spanish oGvernment were in a measure overcome and with the advent of the new Maura Conservative Cabinet there was still less hostility, but, on the other hand, a sudden agitation has grown up in Spanish commercial circles against emigration in general, sa the ground that it is draining the country of labor. The Italian Government has remained s.eadily hostile, and formal notices warning Italian laborers not to go to the Isthmus were placarded throughout the country. Nevertheless, many Italians, attracted by the offer of work, crossed the frontier and left from French ports.
