Conference and Council

The underlying aim of the Imperial Conference which will meet shortly in London is to bind together more closely, in bonds of mutual sympathy and assistance, the various parts of the British Empire. Among the plans suggested for the realization of this aim is the formation of a permanent Imperial Council. It is doubtful if such a scheme will commend itself to the Conference. Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated definitely last week that he was not in favor of such a council.

Mr. Ward, the Premier of New Zealand, is reported as having expressed himself as favorable to the plan, but the Council which he favors may turn out quite different from that which Sir Wilfrid opposes. A conference is an objectionable because it has no legislative power; but the young British nations think too much of their freedom and autonomy to submit themselves in any degree to outside government. A free alliance of sister nations with one another and with the mother land, rather than a federation of any kind, seems to be the direction in which the Empire is tending. The proposal favored both by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr Ward, to seek a definite understanding with the Imperial Government as regards to British treaty obligations is in line with this idea.—Presbyterian.
