**Remembering the Pioneers**

The ratepayers of Vandeleur public  
school section will erect a monument  
this coming summer to the memory  
of the pioneers who were instru-  
mental in forming the section. The stone  
will be placed on the school ground  
and will be erected at a cost of \$175  
It will be an eight foot granite column  
with urn top, placed in cement base,  
and will contain about fifty names of  
those who lived in S. 8. No 11 when  
it was formed. It is believed that this  
is the first monument of the kind erec-  
ted in Ontario, and the good people  
of Vandeleur are certainly to be con-  
gratulated upon taking the initiative  
in such a praiseworthy undertaking,  
and one which we hope will be follow-  
ed by many other school sections  
throughout the country. The pioneer  
who laid the forests low and placed  
the corner stone of our present mag-  
nificent educational edifice was certain-  
ly deserving of having his name loca-  
lly preserved so that coming gen-  
erations may know whom to honour  
and to thank for the heritage which is  
theirs.

**Local Option in Owen Sound**

A respected friend has handed us a  
recent copy of the Canadian Baptist  
containing an article by the Rev S.  
D. Chown, with a request for its pub-  
lication. We give part of it this week  
and may continue it in next issue:

One of our trusted workers recently  
visited Owen Sound for the purpose of  
making a personal investigation of  
conditions there. He has sent us a  
long report containing so many proofs  
of the success of Local Option that we  
are embarrassed with his findings be-  
cause, though the story may be sim-  
ple, it speaks to the heart, and in a  
very realistic way sets forth the  
great advantages of Local Option.

He found that Owen Sound had  
long been noted as a stronghold of  
the liquor traffic. For some time,  
prior to the new order of things, al-  
though there were two licensed  
even licensed hotels, two licensed  
liquor stores, and two breweries stood  
committed to the character destroy-  
ing, drunkard-making business. The  
bar, with its base of supply, the brew-  
eries, was a power felt in the social,  
political and financial affairs of the  
town. It was a school of sin, a real  
factory of evil, turning raw material  
into rowdiness, sober boys and men  
into sots. As a legitimate business,  
it was worked to the full limit the  
law allowed, and scarcely made a  
pretence of being law abiding. In  
the Local Option fight a year ago, it  
was stated on the public platform, and  
later in the public prints, that every  
hotel in Owen Sound was a den—a  
place where liquor was sold illegally,  
and no attempt has been made to re-  
tinue the charge. Our informant says  
that one hotel keeper even boasted of  
the fact that he took in \$200 between  
Saturday night and Monday morning.  
A hotel which made a pretence of  
keeping a moral house was visited by  
a prominent man in the town at ten  
o'clock and again at three o'clock  
in the morning and at both hours  
men were drinking at the bar, and  
as many as three as at ten.

**TEST-MONY OF BUSINESS MEN**

A very large majority of business  
men interviewed were warmly in  
favor of Local Option. The bulk of  
the evidence goes to show that the  
business of the town is not dependent  
upon the bar. That the seller of  
merchandise is made richer by first  
making the buyer poor, is a theory  
that never had a practical demon-  
stration to support it. The increased  
business of the town cannot be ac-  
counted for by any special boom. A  
gentleman in connection with an ex-  
tensive lumber factory is authority  
for the statement that a few years ago  
there was quite a shortage of houses  
and consequently a year or two, but  
which lasted for a year or two, but  
this has passed away.

A close inquiry revealed that some  
lines of business are favorably af-  
fected to a very marked degree.  
The table of the trolly is not likely to  
be scant if he brings his money home,  
and the butcher, the baker and the  
general provision merchant are like-  
ly to have an increased trade. Such

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quality of goods. A confectioner  
stated that he had an increase of fif-  
teen hundred dollars in the first six  
months. Another person in the same  
line of business, who lost the C. P. R.  
trade, amounting to a few hundred  
dollars, is doing better business on the  
whole than before. One of the larg-  
est provision men in town reports in-  
crease and better payment of accounts  
and without hesitation said, "The  
great majority of accounts on grocers  
books are in the name of men who  
drink." A music dealer said, "We  
are one thousand dollars in advance  
of what we were this time last year.  
One man paid fifty dollars that we  
considered was a hopeless case. On  
the whole collections are better. The  
only way we can account for it is that  
the money is not spent for liquor."  
A man in the habit of being around  
the hotels of the town, said, "It does  
not seem like going into a hotel in  
Owen Sound now. It's quiet and  
it's queer."  
The bar business cannot possibly  
be of any considerable size, because  
there is not the crowd near it to do  
business with. The trusted few may  
buy, but the crowd passes on. Local  
Option has knocked the bottom out of  
the bar.
