Canadian Horse Show.

The first Canadian National Horse Show will be held in Toronto, on May 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th. This is the successor of the famous Canadian Horse Show, which is now divided into two parts, consisting of the Spring Stallion Exhibition in March, and the Canadian National Horse Show in May. As it was also the thirteenth year of the Show, the unlucky number was avoided by a new organization representative of the whole Province, as well as of the City of Toronto.

The Show promises to be greater and better than ever, and the St. Lawrence Arena, the new building erected by the City, is admirably suited for the purpose. There are no less than seventy-two classes devoted to the Harness, Saddle, Hunter horses and ponies, and the sum of \$7,000 is distributed.

The principal Officers of the new Association are Mr. George W. Beardmore, M. F. L., President; W. J. Stark, Secretary; Stewart Houston, Manager. Reduced rates equivalent to a single fare for the round trip are offered on all railways.
