A conscientious member of parliament, who fills the duty required of him as the representative of a constituency, finds his time fully occupied during the session with the various standing committees of the House. To these committees all important matters are referred before they come up in the House.

Is Mr. Bourassa ever seen in a committee room? Never. Does he ever add his judgment to the judgment and experience of the members in framing legislation upon which our industrial concerns are based? Never.

Does he ever appear in the Railway Committee and assist in drafting bills upon which the transportation system of Canada is founded? Never.

Does he assist the Public Accounts Committee in examining into the payments made in the government service? Never.

Is he found shoulder to shoulder with other members carefully examining and improving bills for the better government of this country of ours? Never.

Does he ever introduce legislation into the House having for its object the betterment of somebody or some thing? Never.

Does he ever discuss with ministers how money has been spent during the past fiscal year, when the estimates are before the House? Never.

Has he anything to say against the policy of the Government? Nothing. Does he ever attend a caucus? No. What does he do?

He hibernates in a comfortable private room in the House of Commons, supplied him by a Liberal government, and there he cogitates upon matters in respect of which a sensation may develop, and forthwith launches himself into the public gaze. He initiates little or nothing, apparently takes no interest in the business of the country, rarely is found in his seat, and occasionally addresses public meetings or clubs in various parts of Canada.

This is an unbiased statement of fact. His readiness to plunge into a debate which is directed more at Sir Wilfrid Laurier than the Liberal party is obvious. His antagonism and personal dislike to Sir Wilfrid are scarcely concealed, and yet the Prime Minister rarely pays any attention to him unless the circumstances warrant a verbal drubbing. He may be said to be a man of little use in parliament, and his frequent appearances in the time light probably are a true index of his general make up.—Ex.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Review & Globe-1.30

The Minister of Agriculture for Ontario has, for the past two years, had under consideration plans for further assisting the fruit growers of the Province. Spraying has now become, in producing a superior grade of fruit, the most important operation of the year, and while widely practised in certain sections, has not yet been given the attention that it requires in the apple sections. The advent of the power sprayer is of such recent date that the advantages it gives, especially in the spraying of apple orchards, is not yet appreciated.

For many years the Department of Agriculture has been advocating more and better spraying. Demonstrations is the use of hand and power outfits, and the preparation and application of the most effective mixtures, have been given throughout the Province with satisfactory results. It is now felt that such information has been sufficiently diffused and another step forward is proposed.

The Provincial Fruit Growers' Association has within the past three years assisted in organizing a large number of fruit growing associations. One of the aims of these associations has been the co-operative spraying of orchards of their members, and it is now proposed to assist these and kindred organizations in such spraying work.

With this aim in view, the Minister of Agriculture has asked the Legislature for a grant of \$8000 to be devoted to the assistance of fruit growers in the purchase and operation of power spraying outfits. Many associations already own and are operating such machines and these will receive the same aid as those organizing during 1907. The conditions under which the grants are available have been made as simple as possible with the hope that a decided stimulus will be given to the proper spraying of orchards during this and coming seasons. Following are the regulations covering the payment of the grants:

A grant of \$50 will be made to any five or more farmers who unite to form a fruit growers' association for the purchase and operation of a power spraying outfit during the season of 1907. These associations need not be incorporated to qualify for this grant, though incorporation or co-operative associations should be obtained in the full benefits of co-operation are desired.

Co-operative fruit growing associations owning and operating two or more power sprayers will be eligible to draw a grant for each machine operated.

The number of such associations receiving assistance during the present year shall not exceed 100.

At least 25 acres of fruit trees must be thoroughly sprayed during the proper season with each outfit.

A reasonable portion of such spraying must be done on the farms or orchards of each of the parties forming the association.

Such associations before receiving any portion of the grant shall satisfy an inspector of the Department of Agriculture that the above conditions have been complied with and shall make such reports as shall satisfy the Minister of Agriculture.

Associations desirous of participating in this grant must apply to the Department not later than the first day of May.
