Without Fear or Favor.

It appears that the East Wellington License Commissioners have granted a license to each of the four hotels in Fergus although the law will only allow three. This is a pretty piece of business for the Board to put through. Where is the boast of the Whittneys that the license laws would be enforced up to the hilt? What have the Commissioners to say for themselves, and how could Inspector Hampton do such a thing? The plea, insufficient accommodation is a transparent subterfuge. What have the Commissioners to do with accommodation? The Act says so many of a population, so many hotels and that is all there is about it. No wonder Arthur is objecting, having been deprived of one of its licenses though the accommodation is no more ample there. We rather think the Board has got itself into pretty hot water.

We are not blaming the Government in this matter—yet. We are inclined to give it all due credit for its action in refusing to grant licenses in those districts in Northern Ontario where local option by-laws were carried and where they have been quashed by the Courts on mere legal technicalities. But the Government should also make the East Wellington Commissioners sit up and attend to their duties. How can they expect the hotel-keepers to keep within the law if they break it in letter and spirit themselves.—Confederate

Stationary Engineers Certificates

The Legislature of Ontario at its recent session passed an act respecting stationary engineers in which engineers and employers are alike interested. Briefly stated, its provisions are that after the first day of July, 1908, no engineer will be allowed to operate or have charge of a stationary steam plant of 50 horsepower or upwards who does not hold a government certificate. There are three classes of engineers to whom certificates will be granted without the applicant having to undergo an examination, first, those who on the 20th of April, 1907, the date on which the Act was passed held certificates from an association of stationary engineers in Ontario, or a marine or locomotive engineers' certificate; second, engineers who on the above date were in charge of a plant of 25 horse power or over in Ontario; third, engineers who had at any time previous to the passing of this act, not less than two years experience in the operation of such a plant in the province. Those who cannot qualify as above will have to pass the examinations which will hereafter be prescribed by the Board of examiners.

Those interested may obtain a copy of the Act and application forms for certificates by addressing the Secretary, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
