LED AS TO AGE—Joseph Harrison, of Mount Albert, recently sold a horse to Henry Jones for \$75. He said it was eleven years old. After the deal the purchaser had his doubt about the animal's age, and on enquiry had them confirmed. He laid an information against Harrison, and he was tried before Magistrate Hamilton. Jones had present as a witness the man who raised the horse and he said it was sixteen years old. The evidence showed too, that Harrison knew his age. The Magistrate committed him for trial, but granted bail.

The Horse Situation in Ontario

The commissioners appointed some time ago for the purpose of making an enquiry into the horse industry of Ontario have presented their reports to the Department of Agriculture. Commissioners from even the best horsebreeding districts report the presence in numbers of unsound, unpedigreed horses of all kinds and denominations, while in less favored districts other commissioners have almost failed to find one good sound, pure bred stallion of good type and character standing for service. A regrettable feature is the large number of inferior, cheap, trotting bred-stallions owned by hotel and tavern keepers in many of the small villages and towns. The owner of an inferior stallion, in nine cases out of ten, will not allow his horse to stand in the stable and call the money he invested in him dead loss. Rather than this he will send him out to do service as a reduced fee; and he will keep on reducing it until it is quite impossible for anyone to bring in a good kind of stallion to compete against him. The notch premium system of hiring a good stallion for the season to a company which guarantees a certain number of mares has the happiest results in that country. Its introduction here has more than once been commended, the greatest difficulty to overcome, seemingly being the opposition of private stallion owners themselves. The plan of licensing stallions, though presenting difficulties, seems to be the better remedy. At meetings held by the commissioners in each district, the plan for granting licenses met with universal approval. Just when to draw the line in the granting or withholding of a license seems to be the stumbling block in this licensing plan. Mr W. F. Kidd of Simcoe, Ont, one of the commissioners, suggests that the horse which has first class conformation and action a pedigree of some distinct breed, of size and character typical of his breeding, sound in every particular, should receive a first class license. Then the sound, pedigreed horse with fair conformation and action, should receive a second class license. In the third class should be recorded all sound horses of good conformation and action and typical in size and character, of sound distinct breed. This grading will throw out all non-descripts, ineligible for registration, horses pure bred or otherwise, which show hereditary unsoundness or which show distinct inferiority physically.

Geo. F. Marter.

The Toronto Star makes a fine and deserved comment on his principles we quote: "George Frederick Marter, who died last night, was a politician whose principles never yielded to mere expediency. In his time he sacrificed place and power for his convictions, but he never regretted it, for he had the approval of his own heart. He passes away at a time when the world is swinging around to some of his most cherished ideals—notably temperance and a saner, stricter regulation of the liquor traffic"

Artemesia Council.

Artemesia township council met on Saturday last. The members were all present, and the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Communications as follows were presented: From Neil McKinnon and 49 others, asking that the statute labor in the police village of Pricerville be commuted at 75c per day; report of assessors on assessment of the police village of Pricerville; report of reeve re road at lot 24, con. 12; report of committee re Pricerville statute labor and agreement between the council and police trustees report of Court Revision on drainage By-law No. 1; tenders for concrete arch bridge from various parties. By-law 688 to commute statute labor in the village of Pricerville was introduced and read a first, second and third time, also By-law 679, appointing municipal officers for 1907.

Carson—Meads—That the account of J. & W. Boyd for supplies for town hall, \$4.46, be paid—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That John Wright be paid his account of \$4 for taking of sidewalk by-law and the same be charged to the account of the village of Flesherton.—Carried.

Meads—Carson—That the Reeve's account for telephone messages, 60c, be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the account of the Contract Record for advertising for bridge tenders, \$4.60, be paid.—Carried.

Meads—McKenzie—That the account of W. H. Thurston for advertising for bridge tenders, \$2.60 be paid.

Meads—Carson—That Mr Thurston's account of \$55 for advertising drainage By-law No. 1, Proton Station, be paid and the same be charged to the drainage account.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That Mr Carson and Mr Meads be authorized to confer with all parties having fences or other obstructions on certain streets in Pricerville as complained of by Mr McCaule and to take such action as they may deem wise with the object of having the obstructions removed.—Carried.

McLoughry—Carson—That the reeve and treasurer prepare a statement of all moneys received from Leslie Elliott on behalf of the late Robert Smith, and after deducting all expenses incurred the balance be forwarded to Mr Harves, manager of the county house of refuge.—Carried.
