The good old pioneers who braved the forests are few and far between now, for one by one are passing away but their memory shall be ever green to those loved ones left behind, when they think of the hardships that their dear old fathers and mothers endured in leaving out a home in the forests for future generations. Mr McKinnon leaves a family of one daughter, Mrs Roger McEachern, who will miss the kindness of a loving father.
