It is said the Globe, World, Mail and Empire will shortly put on a special train to bring their papers to London in time to catch the early trains from that city every morning.

Quite an interest is taken in the new town baseball league, and practice is held every night. The first game will take place next Tuesday evening between the Manufacturers and the Merchants.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be administered in the Presbyterian church on Sabbath June 2nd. Services, preparatory, will be held on Friday at 2:30 a. m. and 8 p. m. The Rev A. A. Bice will give an address at the service on Friday evening.

Too SEVERE.—A writer in last week's Flesher-ton Advance signing himself "Spectator" and his article "Shame to Priceville" berates the citizens for neglect of their graveyard and dirty and untidy habits in general. We think he is too severe. For a week or two in spring most places have a ragged appearance, and this is what Spectator has been seeing. He should come again in June or July.

The G. T. R. are to rebuild their Stratford car shops on an immense scale. The new shops will be 55 feet wider than the present structure, or 950 feet long by 175 feet wide, and will be run with electricity throughout. One large 120-ton crane will be installed so that it will enable the heaviest locomotive to be lifted up bodily and carried over the top of others from one end of the shop to the other.

John underwent the operation nicely and when seen by Mr Harness on Thursday was resting quietly and in a fair way to recovery unless a more serious relapse occurs, but we hope for the best.

The weekly country paper has as definite an excuse for being in the world as can be furnished by the city dailies. Such a publication is not only a business guide, but is a pulpit of morals; it is a kind of a public rostrum where the affairs of the state are considered; it is a supervisor of streets and roads; it is a social friend, a promoter of friendship and good will. Edited by a broad and just man, such a publication so treats the different sects that they realize their brotherhood and become in reality what they are pictured in print. The town weekly dare not be Presbyterian, or Methodist, or Baptist, but it must select the valuable in each church, and thus it becomes the harmonizer of discord. It binds those whom theology would often separate. Even the so-called small matters of a village or incorporate town are small only to those whose hearts are too full of personal interest. It is very important if some school boy reads a good essay, or speaks well a piece, or sings well a song, or stands high in the class room, that kind of mention should be made publicly of such success, for more young minds are injured by the want of cheering words than are made vain by an excess of such praise.
