Death has again been relieving the
longing desires of an old resident of
this locality, from the pains and
troubles of this world, in the person
of Catharine McArthur relict of the
late James McDonald, elder. On
the morning of the 26th of May, 1907
at the residence of Mr Alex McDon-
ald, Proton, she died at the good
old age of 89 years.

Mrs McDonald left her native
Ile, Mull, Scotland, in the year 1851
residing a year or so in the township
of Vaughan and in 1852, she and her
husband moved to the south line,
Glencel, settling on Lot 46, con 2,
S. D. R., being a hard working
woman she and her husband soon
bowed out a comfortable home for
themselves for their sustenance in
old age. Mr McDonald died 11 yrs
ago, consequently the good old lady
was often left in loneliness as she had
no family of her own to look after
her comforts. In religion Mrs McDon-
ald belonged to the old Presby-
terian faith. She was a woman of
wonderful memory being deprived of
the gift of reading (as she had no
education), she would commit to
memory any portion of Scripture she
listened to and would often put to
shame many who had the advantage
of reading for themselves in correct-
ing them. It would be safe to say,
that there wasn't a chapter from
Genesis to Revelation but what she
could quote some verses therefrom.
Although she had kind friends who
would keep her comfortable, she pre-
ferred living in her own home. She
had always a strong and earnest de-
sire that wherever she would die her
body would be taken to her own
home and have the funeral procession
leave there, but this desire wasn't
accomplished.

The living know that they must
die, but when dead, their memory
and name shall soon be forgotten by
those left behind. One by one of
the dear old people are passing away
and soon none shall be found of those
who entered the forests some 50 or
60 years ago in the prime of life to
hew out a home for those of us un-
born then but now getting on the
down grade of life.

The funeral on Sunday the 26th
May, from the residence of her ne-
phew as stated above, was fairly well
attended, the Rev Mr Matheson con-
ducted the funeral services at the
house on his way to Swinton Park
and Mr Donald Graham of Priceville,
led in earnest prayer at the grave in
Priceville cemetery where the re-
mains were laid to rest beside her
partner in life. Just as the grave
was about closed one of the severest
thunder storms witnessed for a long
time came and many were caught
therein while those that were wis-
drew to the church sheds but a large
number started for their several
homes and got a soaking.

Monday the 27th May, was like a
day in January, blowing and snow-
ing all the afternoon and by all ap-
pearances there will be quite a fall of
it towards evening.

Later tidings came from Calgary
stating that Hugh McInnis was
found dead in bed by his sister, Mrs
Shannon. Mr McInnis had a se-
vere attack of pneumonia lately, from
which he did not fully recover, al-
though able to be around for some
time. He was an infant when his
father and mother came to the Dur-
ham road, Glencel, 56 years ago and
was a faithful young man in attend-
ing to duties entrusted to him as he
was the oldest member of the family
of five sons and two daughters, his
estate is estimated to be worth an
immense sum which goes to his two
sisters and two brothers which are
all that are living.

We hear that J. McArthur & Son,
merchants in this town, intend to

from going elsewhere. We have

Innes of Midnapore took place yester-
day and was one of the most largely
attended ever seen in this section of
Canada. The obsequies at the home
and grave were conducted by Rev J.
A. Clark, pastor of Knox church,
Calgary, assisted by Rev Dr McRae of
the Western Canada college. Inter-
ment was made in the Union cemetery.

The late Mr McInnes was one of the
pioneers of this district and certainly
one of the most successful farmers in
the province of Alberta. He was a
son of the late Duncan McInnes, one
of the early settlers near Durham,
Grey County, Ontario, and came
west 24 years ago and took up 800
acres of land at Midnapore. By the
exercise of industry and intelligently
following the most modern methods
he made his farm a productive one
and earned for himself a splendid
competence. Indeed, he was in a
position to enjoy life in comfort when
death intervened. About a year ago
he suffered from pneumonia, and it
left his heart in a weakened condition
which hastened the end.

He was a Presbyterian in religion
and in politics a staunch Liberal. He
did not take much part in public af-
fairs but served faithfully and well
as a public school trustee. He was
a bachelor and leaves to mourn two
brothers and two sisters, Malcolm,
of Calgary, John of Midnapore, Mrs
Joseph Shannon, of Fish Creek, Alta.,
and Mrs D. McDonald, of Priceville,
Ontario. Mr McInnes was a member
of the order of Eagles. His death re-
moves one of the men who helped
develop this part of Canada and dem-
onstrates rich resources to the world.
He was widely esteemed and many
will miss him. The sorrowing friends
have the deepest sympathy in their
bereavement.—Calgary Paper

**Synopsis of Canadian North-West
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any even numbered section or Dominion lands
in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta,
excepting 5 and 25, not reserved may be home-
steaded by any person who is the sole head of
a family, or a male over 18 years of age; to the
extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more
or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local
Land Office for the district in which the land is
situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the
conditions connected therewith under one of
the following plans:

1. At least six months residence upon and
cultivation of the land in each year for three
years.

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is
deceased) of the homesteader resides upon at
farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the
requirements as to residence may be satisfied
by such person residing with the father or
mother.

3. If the settler has his permanent residence
upon farming land owned by him in the vic-
inity of his homestead, the requirements as to
residence may be satisfied by residence upon the
said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given
to the Commissioner of Dominion lands at
Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
