HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section or Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a male over 18 years of age; to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of 1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon at farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or

3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the
