Priceville

Again amongst the innumerable number that have passed from the trials and troubles of this life during the last couple of weeks, we feel it our duty to chronicle the death of a lady comparatively in the prime of life, in the person of Miss Dorothy McIntyre, eldest daughter of the late Rev Robt McIntyre of the South Line, Glenelg, at the age of fifty seven years. Miss McIntyre was born in Isle of Ulya, Scotland and came to the place where she ended her days when 3 years of age. Being the eldest of a large family the duties of assisting her mother in attending to the various necessities associated in rearing a large family, fell considerably on her. Being of a liberal turn of nature she often denied herself for the sake of making other members of the family comfortable. In religion Miss McIntyre belonged to the Baptist church, being converted and baptised in the days of her youth by Dr Castle of Toronto, and could truly say, that she had fought a good fight and kept the faith, and when this earthly tabernacle crumbled to the dust from whence it came, she could exclaim that now there was a crown awaiting her in the home of many mansions. She spent over twenty years in the city of Rochester, and during her time there she took great interest in Sabbath school work and often her labors were crowned with success. Miss McIntyre had been illness more or less for the last couple of years, but being of a gritty disposition she did not yield till she was compelled to. The immediate cause of death was heart failure caused by other inward ailments. To the aged mother more particularly, the death of her dutiful daughter was a severe blow, after being so recently afflicted by the death of another daughter only a couple of years ago, but the venerable lady has learned to be patient in tribulation, as she has often experienced the adversities to be contended with in this life, and now that she is within a mark of the highest age allotted to man, she too, may soon look forward for a reunion with those loved ones gone before to the home above where no tears are shed and parting is no more.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon the 23rd June from her old home to Priceville cemetery and was largely attended. The Rev Mr Kipp of the Baptist church conducted the service and made some very appropriate reference to the christian life of the departed lady. Mr and Mrs Rose of Bruce, attended the funeral, also Miss Kate McIntyre of Toronto, Mrs Rose and Miss McIntyre being sisters of the deceased.

In conclusion we take the liberty of voicing the sentiments of all friends and acquaintances of the bereaved family in forwarding condolence in the hour of bereavement. Miss McIntyre leaves as chief mourners, an aged mother, five sisters and three brothers. The brothers are, Norman, at the old homestead, Donald of Duluth and James, somewhere in a far off country, one brother Robert died 15 years ago when a young man. The sisters are Mrs Rose of Bruce county, Misses Kate and Minnie of Toronto, Mrs Colker (Janet) of Vancouver and Mrs Chas Ferguson of Egremont. The father, the late Rev Robt McIntyre, died 23 years ago next October.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a male over 18 years of age; 40 the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

- 1. At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
- 2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon the farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
- 3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
