Germany presented to the sub-committee on the proposed prize court a proposition in six articles establishing that arms and war materials be considered as contraband of war, including shotguns. A list of these arms and war materials must be sent to the neutral powers at the outbreak of war. Such contraband of war and also the vessel carrying it are subject to confiscation, except in cases in which the captain of the ship can prove that he was ignorant of the real nature of his cargo. If the vessel carrying contraband of war has soldiers on board, the latter are to be taken prisoners.
