Who Wants Peace, to Dine With President Roosevelt.

New York, July 15 .- "I think the relations of long standing between the United States and Japan should be preserved, and the passing storm disappear in the waters of the Pacific Ocean. firmly believe that this one incident cannot be thrown in the way of the present relations between the two countries, which began at the time of my

Thus spoke Admiral Baron Gombei Yamamoto, Japanese Minister of Marine during the Japanese-Russian war, as a greeting to the American people today on his arrival here with his suite on board the Cunard steamship Cammania, from England. Admiral Yamamoto has been inspecting the gun shops and shipyards of Europe, and while here he will visit the United States navy yards and shipbuilding plants. He was met upon his arrival by Lieut, R. W. Henderson, representing Rear Admiral Goodrich, commander of the New York navy yards. Admiral Yamamoto made the occasion of his arrival an opportunity to deny the reports from Tokio that the leadership of the Progressive party would fall upon him on his return home, and that an effort will be made to overthrow the Saconji Ministry.

He declined to express an opinion on the intention of the United States to send a large fleet of war vessels from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast, The admiral will take luncheon with President Roosevelt on Friday at Oyster Bay.
