The Editor requests us to say something more about our jubilee; as a matter of fact there is nothing left to be said unless we make a repetition of what has been ably penned by the editor in last week's Review. However by the way we may say the editor did justice to all the speakers but to Mr. Chas Ramage who made an excellent speech touching on matters relating to his own personal experience of Priceville just forty years ago being as a printer's devil when the Priceville Courier was in existence in 1868. Mr. Ramage told a story of himself and his father starting off in a north-easterly direction from their residence near Dromore, one Sunday 40 years ago in search of a place to worship and struck for Priceville. Whether they were attracted by the beautiful tones of the bell in St. Andrews Church we cannot say but both went to the "old kirk" to hear the late Rev Donald Fraser preach an eloquent sermon.

The old church is removed and the place where it stood is now filled with the remains of those then in the prime of life. The old bell has the same old tone as forty years ago. Those of us whose voices were melodious then have changed but the old bell has the same old ring.

Those of us who attended service in barns and log school houses, probably wearing out the soles of our birthday boots and attired in homespun suits in meetings long ago are to-day fast going on the down grade of life, and we almost strained our eyes to see if there were any in that vast assembly that fifty years ago attended church, while in life's prime, not one could be found of those brave fathers and mothers whose activity is worthy of reminding for they did not depend on any other conveyance to carry them to the place of worship but their feet and many there were that walked four, six and even eight miles on a Sunday morning in summer time and there in good time.

Those who could afford to drive a team of horses and an old lumber wagon were considered amongst the aristocracy and we remember some (who by the way are citizens of our town, drying their good old saintly mothers who were unable to walk to church, with oxen and old lumber wagons) these were the days of where there was a will there was a way.

The old Methodist church whose foundation is yet to be seen on the late squire Ferguson's place, now his son, Tom's served for a time to accommodate Presbyterians when they had no church of their own. The old school houses east and west of Priceville served the same purpose for years. The old log barns of more than fifty years ago on Mr. McCannel's (now Smelles and Stonehouse) also served their time. The preachers' pulpits as the case might be were often standing on a block of timbers of some kind, unless a very tall man, beside the worshippers when in barns. There were hens and other fowl to contend with who sometimes struck in a key-note of their own as if disgusted listening to the imperfect sound of the leader, or of the psalmist while endeavoring to sing the good old tune of Martyrdom.

The following lines may be sung to the music of twenty years ago:

We looked around if we could see
Some faces we did know
That worshipped there when we were
wee

Just fifty years ago,
But none were there to greet us, who
In life's prime worshipped there
They've left this world of sin and
woe

To join the Heavenly choir.
But we are here and they are there
But still their memory's green
We'll never forget no matter where
The days of Auld Lang Syne.

But soon, ah, soon the call to join
Those loved ones gone before
To us shu'll be extended
And we shall be no more.

But let us all remember
Our years are passing by
And soon 'twill be December
Then it is time to die.

The youth may hope to live and see
In future years ahead
To celebrate the centenary
When we are gone and dead.

CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF GLENELG

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Municipal Council of the township of Glenelg will, at a meeting to be held at the Township Hall in said township, on Saturday, the tenth day of August, 1907, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon, consider a by-law

For the purpose of stopping up, selling and conveying a portion of the highway between concessions two and three, S. D. R., Glenelg, described as follows:

"A" A tract of land of irregular shape, being part of road allowance between Con. 2 and Con. 3, S. D. R., Township of Glenelg, County of Grey, said tract being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly limit of road allowance between Con. 2 and Con. 3, S. D. R., which point is 72 feet easterly from the easterly limit of lot 4 S. Con. 3, when measured along the westerly limit of road allowance; thence westerly along the said southerly limit of road allowance a distance of 182 feet; thence westerly on a straight line whose course is S. 89° 09' W. a distance of 60 feet to a point on a spiral curve to the right whose radius is 100 feet on a curved line to the right whose radius is 100 feet, thence easterly on a straight line whose course is N. 89° 09' W. a distance of 147.4 feet to the southerly limit of road allowance, which is the point of beginning.

Said tract of land containing 2.23 acres, more or less.

And for establishing a highway in lieu thereof, the following, namely:

"B" A strip of land 60 feet wide in Lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, Con. 2, S. D. R., Township of Glenelg, County of Grey, being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly limit of Lot 5, Con. 2, S. D. R., which point is 78 feet easterly from the lot line between lots 4 and 5, thence westerly along the southerly limit of said lots 4 and 5 a distance of 141 feet; thence north-westerly on a straight line whose course is S. 68° 30' W. a distance of 18 feet; thence westerly on a straight line whose course is S. 89° 09' W. a distance of 110 feet; thence easterly on a straight line whose course is S. 89° 09' W. a distance of 60 feet; thence westerly on a straight line whose course is N. 89° 09' W. a distance of 176 feet; thence southerly on a straight line whose course is S. 89° 09' W. a distance of 147.4 feet to the southerly limit of said lot 4, Con. 2, S. D. R., which is the point of beginning.

Said strip of land containing 4.23 acres more or less.

All persons interested, or whose lands may or might be prejudicially affected by such proposed By-law are required to attend at said meeting, when they will be heard in person or by counsel or solicitor with reference thereto upon petition to be so heard.
