Topics of the Week

—The fearful tragedy in London, Ont., caused by the collapse of a building, weakened by structural alterations, resulted in seven deaths and twice as many injured. There will be a searching investigation to fix the blame. A thrilling sight was the heroic work done by rescuers to save imprisoned victims.

—Premier Laurier is home from his trip to the old land and royalty itself could not have been busier and more warmly than he has been at Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa. The welcome has been general, nothing partisan about it, and is a tribute to the ability and fairness he displayed in his duties at the Colonial Conference. His head sits level on his shoulders or it would be turned by the honors.

We rise to second the following motion of the Mt. Forest Conference: The Toronto News has been busy at Cabinet making for Sir Wilfrid. It has nominated Hon. G. P. Graham, William Lyon McKenzie King, deputy minister of labor and Mr. F. F. Pardee for any portfolios that may be vacant. The Confederate would in vite consideration to Mr. H. H. Miller, of South Grey, as a potential minister. He has many qualities that fit him for a position of such responsibility. He is a first class business man, has a wide acquaintance with public affairs, is a fluent and perspicuous public speaker, and last but not least, is of irreproachable character and reputation. We beg leave to nominate Mr. Miller without asking his permission.

—Sir Wilfrid Laurier enjoys in a marked degree the confidence of the people of Canada. Since he assumed power in 1896, he has surrounded himself with colleagues selected from the flower of the Liberal party. It is not unlikely that once more he may find it expedient to call to his assistance able men of the party. It will be found that his selection will be wise and in the interest of the country at large. Canada demands the services of her best men and from the Liberal party a selection can be made to fill acceptably any office in the gift of Government.

Statesmanship of a high order has brought Canada to her present enviable position as the brightest star in the constellation of the colonies. Sir Wilfrid will call for the services of such men as will enable him to continue the policy which has raised Canada from the position of an obscure colony to the dignity of an embryonic nation.

Bounding Revenues.

The customs revenue of the Dominion for the month of June shows an increase of \$1,225,032 over June of 1906. The total revenue for the month from this source was \$5,321,414. For the first three months of the current fiscal year, the revenue was \$15,122,092, an increase of \$2,964,391, over the corresponding period of last year.

It must be observed in this connection that the average duties under the new tariff are less than under the old, and yet the receipts are the largest in the history of the country. What argument can be advanced to turn out of power a government which is so conducting the affairs of the country as to accomplish these desirable results? The people of Canada will seek a continuance of the prosperity which they now enjoy as a result of Liberal policy.
