Corporation of the TOWNSHIP OF GLENELG.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Municipal Council of the township of Glenelg will at a meeting to be held on Saturday, the tenth day of August, 1907, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Township Hall in the said township consider three several bylaws for the purposes following, namely: for closing, stopping up, selling and conveying the following portions of highways respectively, namely:

FIRSTLY. A portion of Harvey St. in the village of Priceville, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the northerly limits of Harvey Street and the westerly limits of the township line between the townships of Glenelg and Artemesia; thence westerly along the northerly limits of Harvey Street a distance of seven hundred and eighty-eight (788) feet to the westerly limits of the village of Priceville; thence southerly along the westerly limits of the village of Priceville, a distance of thirty-five (35) feet; thence northeasterly on a straight line whose course is north seventy-nine degrees thirty-three minutes east (N 79° 33' E.) a distance of three hundred and twelve (122) feet; thence southerly and at right angles to the last described line, a distance of fifteen (15) feet; thence northeasterly on a straight line whose course is north seventy-nine degrees thirty-three minutes east (N 79° 33' E.) a distance of four hundred and seventy-six (476) feet; to the westerly limits of the town line between Glenelg and Artemesia produced southerly; thence northerly along the westerly limits of the town line produced southerly a distance of twenty-three (23) feet to the point of beginning; said tract of land containing fifty-five hundredths (0.55) acres, more or less.

SECONDLY. A portion of Glenelg Street in the village of Priceville, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the easterly limits of Glenelg Street and the northerly limits of Harvey Street; thence northerly along the easterly limits of Glenelg St a distance of one hundred and eighty-nine (189) feet; thence southerly on a straight line whose course is north seventy-nine degrees thirty-three minutes west (S 79° 33' W.) a distance of sixty (60) feet to the westerly limits of Glenelg Street; thence southerly along the westerly limits of Glenelg Street a distance of one hundred and eighty-eight (188) feet to the northerly limits of Harvey Street; thence easterly along the northerly limits of Harvey Street produced easterly a distance of sixty-six (66) feet to the point of beginning; said tract of land containing twenty-eight hundredths (0.28) acres, more or less.

THIRDLY. (Subject to a similar by-law being passed by the municipal council of the Township of Artemesia and subject to the provisions of the Municipal Act.) A portion of the town line between the townships of Glenelg and Artemesia, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the easterly limits of the township line between Glenelg and Artemesia and the northerly limits of Harvey street in the village of Priceville; thence northerly along the easterly limits of the township line between Glenelg and Artemesia a distance of two hundred and three (203) feet; thence south westerly on a straight line whose course is south seventy-nine degrees thirty-three minutes west (S. 79° 33' W.) a distance of sixty-six (66) feet to the westerly limits of the township line between Glenelg and Artemesia; thence southerly along the westerly limits of the town line between Glenelg and Artemesia a distance of two hundred and twenty-five (225) feet; thence north easterly on a straight line whose course is north seventy-nine degrees thirty-three minutes east (N. 79° 33' E.) a distance of six hundred and thirty-three (633) feet to the westerly limits of the town line between Glenelg and Artemesia produced southerly; thence northerly along the westerly limits of the town line produced southerly a distance of twenty-three (23) feet to the point of beginning; said tract of land containing thirty-four hundredths (0.34) acres, more or less.

All persons interested or whose lands may or might be prejudicially affected by such proposed by-laws or any of them are required to attend at the said meeting, when they will be heard in person or by counsel or solicitor with reference thereto upon petitioning to be so heard.
