He soon came to the surface and swam to the boat having learned the valuable art of swimming when a boy. No wonder his friends are congratulating him on the virile qualities that saved his life.

THE TOLL OF THE WATERS.—Toronto Junction is in gloom over a fearful boating calamity in which nine young men lost their lives within a few hundred feet of the shore. Ten of them were returning in a gasoline launch from Hanlan's Point in the small hours of the morning and on the way the engine stopped and in a moment the boat upset and only one in darkness and excitement reached the shore and crawled to his home unnoticed and almost exhausted. The bodies have all been found. A fearful toll is exacted every summer by boating and bathing accidents.

### Durham in Semi-finals

Hanover Vanquished by 11 to 4 in the Deciding Game here on Tuesday.

Judging by the record crowd at Tuesday's match, lacrosse still holds first place in the hearts of Durhamites as our chief sport. Probably more than anything else, the magnet of attraction to this game, was the fact that it decided the winner of district laurels. Hanover, after their defeat at home two weeks ago, resolved to "never say die" and searched for more stars to strengthen their team, with the intention of winning out here.

But it was not so to be. The visitors came here with but one new man coralled, "Paddy" Patterson, and he was not in condition. Then the rest of the Owen Sound bunch failed to show up, so Hanover was compelled to press three or four juniors into harness. This furnishes the natural explanation for Durham's easy win—7 goals. But it is very doubtful if the Owen Sounders had been on hand the score would be closer. The juniors were workers-in the game all through and did their share in holding down the score.

Only one change was made in the Durham's line up from that of their previous match with Hanover, Murray Smith taking the place of Bert McDonald who has been ill. Again Durham struck that winning gait so much in evidence lately and being never closely pressed, were not at any time forced to extend themselves to the limit. It was quite noticeable that when Hanover took a spurt, the Durhams followed up with their fast lacrosse and usually finished by dropping in a goal or two.

Right from the start the Durhams took the lead, McKinstry scoring the first goal in a scrimmage after a two minutes play. For the remainder of the quarter the game was quite fast, Keehner, Hanover's junior goal tender, vieing with Lavelle in blocking everything in sight.

Only a few seconds after the opening of the second period, Will Lavelle rushed in No 2, and McKinstry followed up with the third. Matheson and Kearns, who had blocked almost all rushes to this time let one past, W. Lavelle and Cowan notched two more for the green and white, and Hanover scooped in a second while Lavelle was out of the nets. Half time: Durham 5, Hanover 2.

In each of the remaining quarters Durham notched three goals to Hanover's one. The home team quickly scooped one in, Peiffer scored for the visitors, and McCartney soon made a clean successful shot. After the check off Matheson secured the ball on the defence, ran down the field to outside home and passed to McKinstry, who scored.

To open the last period, McIntyre and McCartney worked a pretty combination which resulted in a counter. The visitors soon secured their last and Durham for the rest of the quarter and game had things almost their own way. W. Lavelle and Cowan finishing the scoring.

Waghorne, the expected referee, was another who failed to "show up" and Addison of Mt Forest, who officiated, did not give general satisfaction. It was the rule rather than the exception to see one Durham man or another with the timekeepers throughout the game. The line up:
