

U. S. Census Bulletin No. 66 tells of the rise and fall of the bicycle. In 1890 the output of the twenty-seven establishments engaged in the maanfacture of "wheels" was valued at \$2,568,356. Soon after that there came the preumatic tire and the popular craze. The ceasue of 1960 reported 312 manufacturers, with a product valued at \$31,915,908. In the same year the industry gave employment to nearly 20,060 wage and salary earners in the department of production slone. It paid \$10,060,000 in wages and salaries, and bought nearly \$17,000,000 worth of materials. Within the next five years it fell off nearly 55 per cent. The craze was over. In 1905 the output value of the industry had fallen to \$5,153,240, or nearly \$2,000,600 less than the value of bicycle exports in 1897. One thing that militates against the "bike" is the danger of accidents in crowded streets. But like roller skating, the bicycle may again

become popular with the masses.

The nation is industrious and ambitious, however, and a few years of peaceful industry will do much to ease her of her load.
