The Passing Pioneers

Alex. McCormack. Saturday last, 10th of August, there was laid to rest in Rocky Saugeen cemetery all that was mortal of Alex. McCormack, whose death we briefly announced last week.

Deceased was a native of Argyleshire, Scotland, and came to this country over 50 years ago and for nearly all that time has lived in Benlinc, where he took his share of the pioneer work and hardships of the early settlers.

The sons are Alex. Sault Ste. Marie; Angus, Montana; Hugh in Ontario; Dan, in Wisconsin; Arch in Milwaukee; and Chas. at home. The daughters are Eliza, Mrs. Duncan McQuarrie; Miss Kate at home, Alex. and Hugh were home for the funeral and the others have written dutiful and comforting letters.

Mrs. Capt. McNab, O. Sound a niece of deceased, attended the funeral.

On Friday last at the age of 74 there passed away one of the pioneers of Benlinc in the person of Mrs. Geo. Overt, who has of late made her home with her son-in-law, Mr. Wm. Whitmore.

Deceased was a native of the island of Jersey and came to this country in the 50's of last century, and lived for a number of years in Hamilton. She was amongst the last of the pioneers of the Benlinc neighborhood.

Town Council

Under this heading last week we published an article which has given offence to Mayor Calder because of two statements in it, not, he claims, in accordance with the facts.

Our memory of the meeting supported by members of the council, was that the sense of the meeting favored the limit imposed by the by-law and by a majority at least did not favor liberty to erect frame buildings in that area.

Here we made a mistake it appears in calling it a motion. Mr. Calder says there was no motion, and we regret the use of the word. What should have been said as far as we have learned since was that the Mayor was not favorable to considering the by-law at all, until what he considered the more important business of striking the rate was attended to.

The council, not willing to do this, he proposed considering the fire clause by clause, which, he alleges, the council were not willing to do, they centring their interest on the amending clause which made clear the permission to erect brick-veneered buildings in the western area.

We give both versions of the matter. We certainly had no intention of desire to misrepresent a mayor whom we have often commended for municipal ability.

We still hope it may be shown that any hardship the by-law imposes will be far more than counterbalanced by the good it will do.

The council met again Friday evening last to consider the rate and asked the School board to reconsider their estimates.
