HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta,

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending home. Proton for a few days before leaving

The homesteader is required to perform the nomestead conditions under one of the follow-1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or

3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
