Com'r Lothian's report shows that he expended \$42.96, chiefly in culverts, repairs and drawing tile &c., and \$124.00 by day labor, grading and graveling under supervision of the pathmasters, Com'r fees \$8.00.

Ferguson—Lothian—That the acct of C. Drum for 40 bags cement and one gal oil am't'g to \$22.90 be paid.—Carried. Com'r McArthur voted "Nay" on this motion.

The school Inspector is asked to apporportion \$58.04 bal of Legislative grant to Public Schools in Egremont, among the various sections in the proper proportions.

Com'r Philip's report shows that he had expended in small jobs \$38.50 and in grading and graveling under supervision of the pathmasters \$124.55 by days labor, Com'r fees \$2.50, as Inspector of drains, he reported 70 rds completed on No 1, and recommended payment of \$105, and found completed on No 4 210 rds and recommended payment of \$100.00. Report adopted, fees \$1.25, charged to drain 1. Com'r McArthur reported small jobs am't'g to \$40.55 and graveling \$23.10, Com'r fees \$6.00

Com'r Walter Ferguson reported chiefly grading and graveling by days labor am't'g to \$194.75, com'r fees \$8.00. By the new education Act, the township treasurer will honor the orders of the school trustees for the amounts required for the payment of teacher's salaries. The trustees are required to furnish the clerk with the total amount required by their action for all school purposes, including teacher's salaries during this year by Sep 1st, 1907. To guard against mistakes, trustees are requested not to take into consideration the general school grant of \$300.00 to each section in making out their estimates.

Orders to the amount of \$238.51 were passed chiefly for gravel, tile and cement Council adjourned to meet on Thursday 19th September, to levy the rates and general business.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting s and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 yrs of age; to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead conditions under one of the following plans:

- 1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
