GREAT WORDS OF GREAT MEN Or Sabbath Observance

EARL OF SHAFTESBURY.—The following is an extract from the speech of Lord Shaftesbury at the 25th annual meeting of the Working Men's Lord's Day Rest Association: "I maintain that the Lord's Day is one of the greatest boons ever given by God to man. It is absolutely necessary for his physical health, and necessary to enable him to bear the wear and tear of the six day's work. Medical men who have studied the subject deeply tell us that one day in seven is the best proportion that could have been devised for restoring the strength taken away by the wear and tear of the week that is not restored by sleep at night. I cannot conceive anything more beneficial even for those who have plenty of leisure, and who have the disposal of their own time, affording them, as it does, opportunities for the contemplation of higher things. But if it is necessary for such persons what must it be in the case of working men who rise up early and go to bed late, and who toil all the week? For such persons the benefit is so manifest that I wonder how any one could question it for a single moment. Aye, and is not the Sabbath essential to the proper cultivation of man's highest nature? Show your gratitude to God for this boon by doing all you can to maintain it for yourselves and for others. Never be silent on the subject; let it be constantly in your thoughts. SIR J. GORDON SPRING, Premier of Cape Colony, made a speech during his stay in London on the observance of the Lord's Day. He expressed his firm conviction that no man could really prosper or live to an old age who failed to observe the weekly day of rest, and that no country could ever be prosperous where there was Sunday trading or Sunday excursions for pleasure.

An Unexpected Reform.

When Chicago doubled its liquor license fee it hoped to gain two objects --the wiping out of the cheap saloons, notoriously the haunts of crime and the breeding spots of crime, and an increase in the revenue which would permit the enlarging of the police force. But the increase of the saloon licence from \$500 to \$1,000 seems to have wrought another and unexpected reform. It has reduced Chicago's consumption of liquor and inferentially its drunkenness. As soon as the high license law was enacted the saloonkeepers set about to make it as objectionable to their patrons as themselves. They cut out the free lunch, abandoned the schooners and began serving small glasses on the ground that they cannot afford under the new rate to be as generous as of old. The purpose is, of course, plain, as reproachfully said by one saloonkeeper to his protesting customers: "We got to make the drink fit the wishes of the community, which is not you fellows." It is thus put up to "you fellows" to get a majority and be the community.

But the saloonkeeper overlooks the fact to which a contemporary calls attention that the reduction may be a double-edged object lesson. In doubling the license fee cuts the size of the drink in half it is not likely that the opponents of the saloon may be found asking how high the fee would have to be raised to cut out the drink altogether? This is a pertinent inquiry and it seems to be a logical one.

Use Ontario Flour

Only by wisely adopting new discoveries can the farmers of this Province compete on even terms with the West, whose specialty is wheat. Western flour has invaded Ontario, and the decline in the demand for Ontario wheat is to-day a fact only too evident to farmers. Ontario agriculturists, in many instances, buy Western flour, raise little or no wheat, and for what they do raise, are not receiving a price commensurate with their labor--all largely because they will not use the flour made from wheat they grow themselves, owing to a mistaken belief that the Western flour is better. In addition to this loss of market, the cost of feed is too high to enable stockmen and dairymen to realize the profit which, under proper conditions, ought to be assured.

It will be somewhat of a surprise for most farmers, to learn that Ontario flour is a favorite in the Eastern provinces; and that in the face of strong competition, it has for several years been preferred in the Maritime Provinces, to the best Western brands. The discovery of flour-blending rights and the fact that the demand for Ontario wheat; and this ought to attract the attention of Ontario farmers to a question of vital importance to the agricultural interests of the province.

Blended flour is simply the best of Ontario's finely-favored product to which a small proportion of Western wheat is added to bring up the percentage of gluten, or "strength." Freed from technicalities of chemistry and milling, it means both strength and flavor in the daily loaf. Viewed economically, it means an increased market for an Ontario-grown product which has won the unprejudiced favor of the East.

Whether this will prove true of Ontario, and whether such a demand will be created that the price of wheat will improve, and the cost of bran and shorts become lower, depends upon the individual farmer. Buying Western flour means a negative answer to the query; if, however, the Ontario farmer is alive to the situation, he cannot financially afford to neglect the latest discovery in practical economics, and will insist on buying only the flour milled in Ontario.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Municipal Council of the Township of Glenelg will, at a meeting to be held at the township hall in the said township, on Saturday, September 14, 1907, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon to consider a bylaw

For the purpose of stopping up, selling and conveying a portion of the highway between Concessions two and three, south of the Durham Road, Glenelg, described as follows: 1. A tract of land of irregular shape, being part of road allowance between Concession two and Concession three, south of the Durham Road, township of Glenelg, County of Grey, being more particularly described as follows: BEG- GINNING at a point on the southerly limit of said road allowance, which point is two hundred and seven feet easterly from the westerly limit of lot thirteen, concession 3, south of the Durham road, when measured along said southerly limit of road allowance; thence northerly on a straight line whose course is N. 61 degrees, 41' E. a distance of one hundred and eighty feet to the northerly limit of said road allowance, thence westerly along said northerly limit of said road allowance, a distance of five hundred and eighty feet; thence easterly on a spiral curve to the right a distance of fifty feet; thence southwesterly on a curved line to the right having a radius of twenty eight hundred feet a distance of one hundred and fifty eight feet to the southerly limit of said road allowance; thence easterly along said southerly limit of said road allowance a distance of six hundred and five feet to the point of beginning; said tract of land containing nine tenths (0.90) acres more or less.

And for establishing a highway in lieu thereof, the following namely: 2. A strip of land sixty six feet wide in lots thirteen, twelve and eleven con. 3, south of the Durham Road, Township of Glenelg, County of Grey, more particularly described as follows: COMMENCING at a point on the northerly limit of said lot 13, which point is two hundred and seven feet easterly from the westerly limit of said lot thirteen, when measured along said northerly limit; thence easterly along said northerly limit a distance of one hundred and seventy feet; thence southwesterly on a straight line whose course is S. 61 degrees 41' W., a distance of three hundred and eighty five feet to a point on a spiral curve; thence on a spiral curve to the right a distance of one hundred and eighty five feet; thence on a curved line to the right having a radius of three thousand and ninety one feet a distance of eleven hundred and ten feet to a point on a spiral curve; thence westerly on a spiral curve to the right a distance of seventy one feet to the westerly limit of said lot eleven; thence northerly along said westerly limit of said lot eleven a distance of sixty six feet; thence easterly on a spiral curve to the left a distance of seventy six feet; thence northeasterly on a curved line to the left having a
