As has become usual with the Canadian National Exhibition, special efforts will be made to give the people of Canada an Exhibition of fine Art that cannot be seen outside the most famous galleries in Europe. Already the consent of His Majesty the King has been obtained to the loan of several of the historical pictures in his Palaces of Windsor and Buckingham. Loans have also been promised by several of the leading Art Galleries of England and Europe, representing the Flemish, Belgian, French, Italian, Spanish, Modern English and Barbican Schools.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands (excepting in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting in any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 yrs of age, to the or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead conditions under one of the following plans:

1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
