Thanksgiving Day.

According to present plans Thanksgiving Day will be held on October 28, the last Tuesday of that month. The Commercial Travellers' Association, however, with headquarters at Toronto, Montreal, and Winnipeg, have made representations to the Secretary of State that the anniversary should be changed to a Monday so as to allow many persons an opportunity of taking part in family reunions who are not able to do so when the celebration takes place in the middle of the week. The Secretary of State has been assured also that Monday would be a much better day from the point of view of the bank clerks and of all others who could reach their homes for a week-end celebration. But the week-end celebration is just what the government is anxious to avoid in the observance of Thanksgiving. The day is set apart as a holiday not for special encouragement of feasting-making and sports, but as a day of national rejoicing in the continued blessing of Providence upon Canada as a people and upon Canadians individually.

That the change to Monday, will be granted is, therefore, rather doubtful, the government's promise that they will be heard before anything is definitely decided.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

A. In Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting s and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 17 years of age; to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the Local Land Office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by a family member, brother, mother, son, or stepparent.

The homesteader is required to perform the following conditions under one of the following five plans:

1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
3. If the settler has his permanent residence on adjoining land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
4. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
5. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior.


