## Synopsis of Canadian North-West

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 yrs. of age; to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead conditions under one of the follow-1. At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for, three

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or
