Political Buncombe.

Mr. Borden in his platform says the Conservatives want honest appropriation and expenditure of public money in the public interest. This is a style of "plank" which, no matter by whom made is modern political buncombe. Of course the Conservatives want this and so do the Reformers. What party except a party of idiots would want anything else? Oh! but, says one, look what this, that or the other Grit did in the day of power, and the Grit unflinchingly replies by pointing to some scandal in the Tory regime.

The attempt is constantly made to fasten on a party the sins of its individual members and this is the only course unless that party shakes itself free from its questionable followers by demanding and securing investigations, that are plainly and satisfactorily ingenious.

Others of Mr. Borden's planks are of the same nature, and there seems to be a set determination that the coming campaign shall be one of scandal-mongering and the "you too" argument.

Let us hope that nothing will be hidden, but surely we may hope at this growing time to see something of a constructive nature occupy our attention, and not advertise ourselves to the world as a people wholly given over to the discovering and publishing of so-called scandals in the ranks of our opponents.

Notes

—Passengers and eyewitnesses of the Caledon disaster unite in saying there was excessive speed, while the train crew unite in denials. To nearly all readers the testimony of survivors and onlookers seems unshakable. The young man of 23 was on his first run as engineer over that portion of the road and he may have been anxious to make a good record for himself.

—Right-Rev. Dr. Arthur Ingram, Lord Bishop, of London, was a lion of Toronto for a few days. He is described by one writer as "a veritable militant general, ever fighting the battles of the poor, and oppressed and waging war in deadly earnest against vice, intemperance and all social evils." He has many descriptive titles, a characteristic one being "Bishop of the slums."

—Mr. R. L. Borden finished his Ontario tour on Saturday and is now off to Brit. Columbia and will work eastward home. He has had good meetings as was to be expected, being a clean man himself, though the enthusiasm does not seem to have been as exuberant as might have been looked for. He has held twenty-one meetings so far and will have as many more at least before his 10 weeks tour is over.

The Japanese Difficulty.

The treaty with Japan, which forms the special difficulty of what is now becoming a most formidable question, was surely a very adventurous proceeding. It might have involved Great Britain, and Canada with her, perhaps by some Japanese contrivance, in a war with Russia. It was the outcome of the anti-Russian policy which has been pursued for the last half century in the unfounded belief that Russia had designs upon British India. Had Russia formed any such design she would hardly have neglected the opportunity given her by the absorption of all the forces of Great Britain in the war. It does not appear that on Boer war. It was the outcome of a measure of such importance to Canada her Government was ever consulted, or that it even received information of the treaty. So much for Canadian nationality! When shall we learn that it is impossible to be at once a dependency and a nation?

Japan is flushed with victory and her people are almost insanely patriotic. It is difficult to see a solution. But the Japanese Government, being still friendly and seeing the danger, might perhaps consent, if not to the withdrawal, to a temporary suspension of its immigration privileges, which would give feeling, now so dangerously excited, time to cool. This, as a mere measure of temporary precaution equally needed by both Governments, Japanese sensibility might bear.—Goldwin Smith in the Sun.

Ocean Speed

A new steamship record between a European port and New York was made by the Cunard Line's new giant turbine-ship, the Lusitania. The Lusitania left Queenstown, the nearest trans-Atlantic port to New York, at 12.10 p. m., Sunday, and arrived off the Sandy Hook Lightship at 8.05 a. m. American time, making the time for the trip 5 days and 51 minutes. This is 6 hours and 29 minutes better than the previous Queenstown-New York record of 5 days 7 hours and 25 minutes, held by the Lucania of the same line.

While the Lusitania has made a new record for the time a passenger is actually on board ship she has not beaten the average speed per hour record, both the Kaiser Wilhelm II., which has made 23.53 knots per hour from New York to Plymouth, and the Deutschland, with a record of 23.51 knots per hour to Plymouth, have been made better time. The Lusitania's speed per hour on her maiden voyage was 23.01 knots per hour.

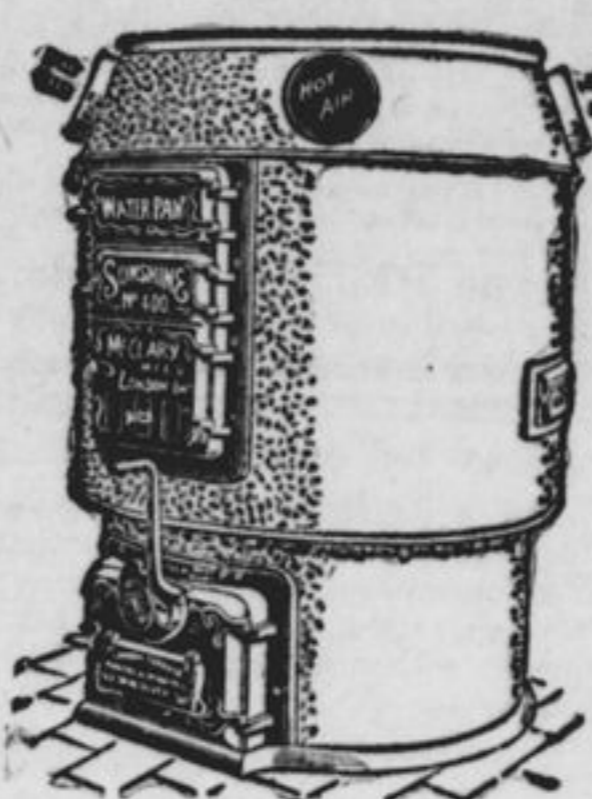

carbon or proted in bread. But he is vitally interested in those problems and the cost of living. There seems to be little relation between the loaf on the table and the markets of the province. There is a close relation, however—because of the fact that individuals all over Ontario insist on buying Western flour, thinking it the best because it has been so extensively advertised. This, taken in the aggregate, has caused the decline in the demand for Ontario wheat and the building up of the West at the expense of Ontario farmers and millers.

That the market has been largely lost and the price is dear cannot be disputed, but what is vastly more important to the farming community of Ontario is the signal success of Ontario millers in driving out Western competition in the Maritime markets. People in Ontario eat bread made from Western flour. People in the Maritime Provinces prefer what is known as Ontario blended flour, and the effect of this demand is already felt by those millers who make a speciality of the new flour.

The exploitation and discovery of the fact that just enough Western flour needs to be added to the richly flavored, but weaker flour of Ontario, to make the best and most nourishing bread in the world, spells opportunity for Ontario farmers. They cannot afford to neglect the latest move to regain the home market, and the sooner they realize that it is financially folly to encourage Western industry at the expense of their own bank accounts, and insist on buying only flour milled in Ontario, the sooner will such a demand be created for Ontario blended flour, that millions of money will remain in Ontario, to benefit the wheat growers and stockmen of this province.

Profits of the Traffic

The proposal of Commissioner Starr of Toronto that the Government take the unearned increment of the license holder and devote it to educational purposes will strike a good many people as a curious admirer of cases. Why Education? Wouldn't it be a great deal more rational to devote the profits of the traffic to the keeping up jails, operating police and other criminal courts, sustaining poor houses and infirmary hospitals. The receipts from licenses do not begin to defray the public cost of the liquor traffic. If Mr. Starr wants an outlet for an increased share of the profits why not credit them to the country's and increasing bill of expense against the traffic?—The Pioneer.

Invited The Inspector

Robert Merigold, hotelman, Hamilton, on Saturday night of the week before last met License Inspector Birrel on the street and invited him down to his hostelry. The Inspector accepted the invitation, and when they

entered they beheld one of the bartenders behind the bar and about ten men lined up on the outside, drinking. There was nothing for the Inspector to do but lay a charge. In the public court Mr. Merigold admitted the corn through his lawyer, John G. Farmer, but, because of the unusual circumstances, and of the fact that the bartender had disobeyed instructions by having the bar open, his worship was asked to impose a minimum fine. He said as requested, and it cost Mr. Merigold \$20.—Ex. He won't do this again.

How to Cook a Husband

A good many husbands are utterly spoiled by mismanagement. Some women keep their husbands constantly in hot water; others let them freeze through carelessness and indifference. Some keep them in a stew by irritating ways and words. Others roast them. Some keep them in a pickle all their lives. No husband will be tender and good, in this way, but will be really delicious when properly treated. In selecting your husband you should not be guided by silvery appearance, as in buying mackerel, nor by the golden tint as if you want salmon. Be sure to select him yourself, as tastes differ. Do not go to the market for him, as the best is always brought to the door. It is far better to have none unless you will patiently learn how to cook him. See that the linen in which you wrap him is neatly washed and mended with the strongest number of buttons and strung sewed on. Tie him in the sauceman by a silk cord called "comfort," as the one called duty is apt to be weak. He is apt to jump out of the sauceman and be brined and crusty on the edges, since, like crabs and lobsters, you have to cook him alive. Make a clear, steady fire out of love, neatness and cheerfulness, as near as seems to agree with him. If he frizzes and sputters, do not be anxious some husbands do this till they are quite done. Add a little sweetening in the form of kisses, but no vinegar or pepper. A little spice improves him, but it must be used with judgment. Do not stick any sharp instruments into him to see if he is becoming tender. Stir him gently. You cannot fail to know when he is done. If thus treated you will find him very palatable, agreeing nicely with you and the children. He will keep as long as you want unless you become careless and, through inattention, let him become chilled.—Peeble's Every month.
