**South Grey Show**  
Fine Exhibits, but unfavorable weather.

For a long series of years South Grey Show has been favored with fine weather, but this year was an exception, rain having fallen on both days and temperature low. However, while outside features are necessarily dampened, literally and figuratively, well up to the average and in some of its features, better.

Notably is this so in grain, and good quality. The day summer however, was reflected in the roots and vegetables which were below the average in size and quantity if not in quality. The fruit was a surprise to judges and the public for its uniform being keen. The competition here too, pictures of delight and in great profusion and above the average. The corn stalks and sheaf oats shown were conspicuous features and the display of grain in sheaf might well receive more encouragement.

Upstairs the ladies' work claimed first attention and experts say it was fine and above the average. The important department of bread, pastry, pickles, etc., was more than up to the mark we should say, and competition honored of taking three firsts in the bread classes, a habit she has acquired of recent years. The Edge's and the Binnie's are to the front in the butter classes as usual, and judging of the fine quality of all the samples must have been no easy task.

Deserving credit for fine business displays are H. H. Mockler, with some pretty tartans, silk waists, curtains, scarfs, &c.; Miss Dick, of the Parisian Millinery Co., with a glass case filled with attractive goods of his famous robes; McQueen, with an elegant Bell piano, furnishing sweet music, and near by a Moravia piano shown by Clark. Last but not least by any means was Russell, of the Big Store's appropriate display of Empire Queen stoves, for heating or cooking, the latter quality having practical exemplification by the baking and distribution of delicious cakes baked on a fine range, the baker being Mr Harding, one of Mr Russell's assistants, and we should say a good judge of the baking qualities of stoves.

The Poultry exhibit was a creditable one and we think up to the mark especially in the Wyandotte and Plymouth Rock classes. Swine were scarcer than usual as were cattle, but sheep never better, and in this class drew unstinted praise from the judges. The horse exhibit too was the best for years and in most classes there was keen competition.

But we must leave to the prize list the details of the winning. There was on the whole a good show if the weather was of the worst, showery, cold and forbidding, and that there were even so many present was surprising. The Directors will have a personal experience we presume in financing, but there will be no let up in progress owing to one series of bad days.
