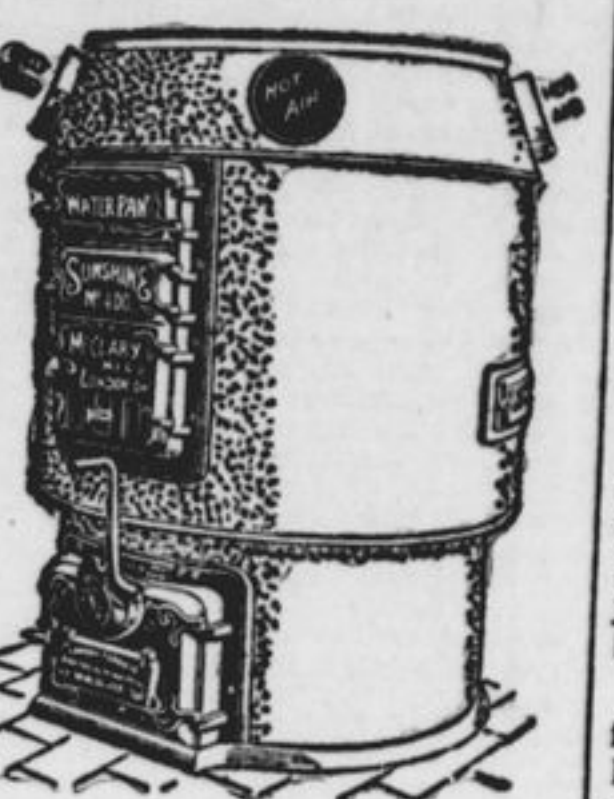

McLoughry—Carson—That John Webber be paid \$4.50 for mending culverts and filling holes on valley road.—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That this council grant \$16 to be expended by Messrs. McLoughry in completing contracts in ward No. 2.—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That McLoughry's report of expenditure in ward 2 be received and he be paid \$24, commission on an expenditure of \$240.—Carried.

Meads—Carson—That Mr. McKenzie's report on expenditure in ward 4 be received and that he be paid \$14.95 on ward expenditure, \$4 for work on grader and \$7.50 commission on expenditure on Campbell's bill.—Carried.

Grey Deanery

The September Deanery meeting of Grey was held in Owen Sound on Wednesday and Thursday, Sept 11th and 12th. Rev. J. Ardill, R. D., presided at all the meetings.

A special opening service was held on Wednesday evening. Prayers were said by R. J. Ardill, and the sermon was preached by Rev. A. A. Bice, Rector of Durham, on Hagai 1: 2-5. Owing to the very wet evening the attendance was not as large as was expected.

On the following morning at 10.30 the Holy Communion was celebrated at which the Rector acted as celebrant, with Roy T. H. Brown assisting. The Chapter then adjourned to the Rectory when Rev. W. G. Keilly, of Chatsworth led in a sacred study of Mathew xx. 1-17 in which the speaker brought out many bright and helpful thoughts.

Rev. T. H. Brown, of Meaford, followed with an exceedingly interesting paper on "The church in its Liturgy and Religion." At 7 o'clock the meeting adjourned for luncheon, kindly prepared by Mrs. Ardill.

At 3 p.m. the Business Session was formally opened. The minutes of the May meeting held in Durham were read and accepted.

Rev. J. Ardill gave an interesting and instructive paper on "Manuscripts of the Bible." After the paper by the Rural Dean many subjects of special interest to the church, with which each clergyman had to grapple, were discussed at much length, such as the S. S. C. G. and Diocesan collections, the Jubilee Fund; appeal for brother in distress; Deacons work and immigration.

Many useful plans used in various parishes which will prove helpful to all in meeting the demands made upon the parishes. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the Rev. J. and Mrs. Ardill for their kind hospitality to all.

On motion, moved by Rev. J. A. Robinson, seconded by Mr. Elliott, it was decided to hold the next meeting in Markdale.

Those present were: Rev. J. Ardill, R. D., Rev. T. H. Brown, W. J. Connor, W. G. Keilly, J. A. Robinson and A. A. Bice and Messrs. Elliot, Markdale, and C. D. Liddell, of Brook.
