Before the advent of packing establishments, the domestic trade was supplied by the local butchers, who were necessarily compelled to provide for future supplies, and, as a result, the local markets were created. Conditions have changed however, the local dealers no longer supplying the domestic trade. which has passed into the hands of the packing houses, which are now the dissome extent, a safeguard against possible attempts by local combinations of butchers for reasons which are obvious when one considers that profits are represented by the by-products. The packers are adverse to buying dressed carcases as they represent smaller profits in by-products; again dressed carcases are imperfectly handled by the farmer, the meat in many cases being bruised and unsightly, this, as well as chilling, being deterrent to good prices.

Some extent, a safeguard against possible attempts by local combinations of butchers and others to depress the price of dressed meats, and it will be well for producers to bear in mind the new conditions and when, for any reason, unable to market their stock on the hoof as they should undoubtedly do whenever possible, dress their hogs, as well as other animals in such a way as to meet the requirements of the new Varney, Ont.


